GATHERING

Preparing for Virtual Worship

Set up a space in your home for worship and prayer. Light a candle, set out a cross or icon to help you focus; set your phone on Do Not Disturb, wash your hands. Take a few deep breaths and say a short prayer to prepare your heart to "enter" a different kind of space. We recommend the Collect for Purity:

Almighty God, to you all hearts are open, all desires known, and from you no secrets are hid: Cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you, and worthily magnify your holy Name; through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Prelude: Three Early 20th-Century Voluntaries

Andante grazioso Chorale Adoration Kate Boundy (c. 1866-1913) Alice Sauvrezis (1865-1946) Florence B. Price (1887-1953)

These beautiful miniatures provide a space for reflection and calm before worship. Kate Boundy was a highly esteemed British organist whose compositions were published for use in churches. Alice Sauvrezis was a French composer, pianist, choral conductor, and concert organizer. Florence B. Price was an American composer, and also an accomplished pianist and organist. Price is noted as the first African-American woman to be recognized as a symphonic composer, and the first to have a composition played by a major orchestra.

The First Reading

Romans 13:8-14

Owe no one anything, except to love one another; for the one who loves another has fulfilled the law. The commandments, "You shall not commit adultery; You shall not murder; You shall not steal; You shall not covet"; and any other commandment, are

summed up in this word, "Love your neighbor as yourself." Love does no wrong to a neighbor; therefore, love is the fulfilling of the law.

Besides this, you know what time it is, how it is now the moment for you to wake from sleep. For salvation is nearer to us now than when we became believers; the night is far gone, the day is near. Let us then lay aside the works of darkness and put on the armor of light; let us live honorably as in the day, not in reveling and drunkenness, not in debauchery and licentiousness, not in quarreling and jealousy. Instead, put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh, to gratify its desires.

The Gospel

Matthew 18:15-20

Jesus said, "If another member of the church sins against you, go and point out the fault when the two of you are alone. If the member listens to you, you have regained that one. But if you are not listened to, take one or two others along with you, so that every word may be confirmed by the evidence of two or three witnesses. If the member refuses to listen to them, tell it to the church; and if the offender refuses to listen even to the church, let such a one be to you as a Gentile and a tax collector. Truly I tell you, whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven. Again, truly I tell you, if two of you agree on earth about anything you ask, it will be done for you by my Father in heaven. For where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them."

Hymn of the Day: Joyful, Joyful, We Adore Thee

Hymn 376

Joyful, joyful, we adore thee, God of glory, Lord of love; hearts unfold like flowers before thee, praising thee, their sun above. Melt the clouds of sin and sadness; drive the dark of doubt away; giver of immortal gladness, fill us with the light of day. All thy works with joy surround thee, earth and heaven reflect thy rays, stars and angels sing around thee, center of unbroken praise. Field and forest, vale and mountain, blooming meadow, flashing sea, chanting bird and flowing fountain, call us to rejoice in thee. Thou art giving and forgiving, ever blessing, ever blest, well-spring of the joy of living, ocean-depth of happy rest! This well-known melody was created to provide a choral setting for Schiller's poem, "To Joy," as the final movement of Beethoven's (1770-1827) Ninth Symphony. The hymn text was written in 1907 by a prominent Presbyterian pastor, who had Beethoven's tune in mind while enjoying the beauty of the Berkshire mountains where he was serving as a guest preacher at Williams College, Williamstown, Mass.

Eating Together: Suggestions for Your Table

We invite you to use this packet to deepen your home worship and provide thoughtful reflection for you and your family.

The readings for Sunday remind us of the light Jesus brings to our lives; from Romans 13: "Let us then lay aside the works of darkness and put on the armor of light; let us live honorably as in the day..." and that it doesn't matter where or how we are gathered, he reminds us that he is here: "For where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them." (Matthew 18)

There are days we feel alone, and in darkness, but if we step outside in the brightness of the day and breath slowly and deeply, in and out, and listen to the sounds of nature and daily life—the songs of birds, leaves rustling in the breeze, and the human sounds of traffic in the distance, or a neighbor mowing their lawn—these seemingly small nuances of life remind us that there is joy and light in our daily routines, and life surrounds us. Seek the joy and be the light.

Here's a prayer you can use before dinner:

God, you are the power of liberation, calling your servant Moses to lead your people into freedom, and giving him the wisdom to proclaim your holy law. Be our Passover from the land of injustice, be the light that leads us to the perfect rule of love, that we may be citizens of your unfettered reign; we ask this through Jesus Christ, the pioneer of our salvation. Amen.
