Written as a song for children, this text of Isaac Watts (1674-1748) was originally titled "Praise for Creation and Providence." The tune is a transcription of an English folk song made by Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872-1958) for The English Hymnal of 1906.


Let us confess our sins against God and our neighbor.



#### The New Testament

If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh, I have more: circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless.

Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but one that comes through faith in Christ, the righteousness from God based on faith. I want to know Christ and the power of his resurrection and the sharing of his sufferings by becoming like him in his death, if somehow I may attain the resurrection from the dead.

Not that I have already obtained this or have already reached the goal; but I press on to make it my own, because Christ Jesus has made me his own. Beloved, I do not consider that I have made it my own; but this one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, I press on toward the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus.

# Sequence Hymn: When I Survey the Wondrous Cross

Hymn 474

This familiar text grew out of Isaac Watts's (1674-1748) desire to give Christians the ability to sing about gospel events. His original title for the hymn was "Crucifixion to the World by the Cross of Christ." It has been acclaimed as one of the finest English hymns for its carefully crafted language depicting Christ's suffering.

The Gospel John 12:1-8

Priest The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Six days before the Passover Jesus came to Bethany, the home of Lazarus, whom he had raised from the dead. There they gave a dinner for him. Martha served, and Lazarus was one of those at the table with him. Mary took a pound of costly perfume made of pure nard, anointed Jesus' feet, and wiped them with her hair. The house was filled with the fragrance of the perfume. But Judas Iscariot, one of his disciples (the one who was about to betray him), said, "Why was this perfume not sold for three hundred denarii and the money given to the poor?" (He said this not because he cared about the poor, but because he was a thief; he kept the common purse and used to steal what was put into it.) Jesus

said, "Leave her alone. She bought it so that she might keep it for the day of my burial. You always have the poor with you, but you do not always have me."

# RESPONDING TO THE WORD

The Nicene Creed (leader and people, all standing)

Offertory Anthem: Drop, Drop, Slow Tears

Orlando Gibbons, arr. Arnatt


Drop, drop, slow tears, and bathe those beauteous feet, which brought from heaven the news and Prince of Peace. Cease not, wet eyes, his mercies to entreat; to cry for vengeance sin doth never cease. In your deep floods drown all my faults and fears; nor let his eye see sin, but through my tears.

Orlando Gibbons (1583-1625) was one of the leading English composers of the Tudor era. British/American organist Ronald Arnatt (1930-2018) used one of Gibbons' tunes as the basis for this anthem. The 17th-century text takes the story of the woman bathing Christ's feet with her tears and uses it as a prayer for Christ's blood to cleanse our souls.



... By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever.




# The Lord's Prayer

The Celebrant says the following Invitation

The Gifts of God for the People of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

- Communion is distributed at the rail in both kinds (bread and wine).
- If you would like to receive in both kinds, for the time being we ask that you intinct (dip) the bread into the wine rather than drinking directly from the chalice.
- It is perfectly fine to decide to receive in one kind only.

# Let Thy Blood in Mercy Poured

Hymn 313

The gifts to us of the redemptive act of Christ in his crucifixion, and our response in the giving of ourselves to him, are reflected upon in these words by poet John Brownlie (1859-1925). The text is paired with a 17th-century Lutheran chorale tune.

This text by David Hughes (1911-1967) describes the reality of the human condition in vivid language, and gives our penitential cry strong emotional intensity. The editors of our hymnal have paired this Lenten poem with a tune by the great English composer Jeremiah Clarke (1674-1707).

### The Post Communion Prayer

After Communion, the Celebrant says

Let us pray.

Almighty and everliving God, we thank you for feeding us with the spiritual food of the most precious Body and Blood of your Son our Savior Jesus Christ; and for assuring us in these holy mysteries that we are living members of the Body of your Son, and heirs of your eternal kingdom. # Recessional Hymn: Lord, Whose Love Through Humble Service

Hymn 610

This text, rich in scriptural references to the life, ministry, and the suffering of Jesus, closely relates his life and mission to the lives and responsibilities of contemporary Christians. It was written in 1961 by British Congregational minister Albert Bayly (1901-1984). Our hymnal pairs Bayly's text with the 19th-century Welsh tune Blaenhafren.

# Postlude: Fugue from Sonata No. 6 in D Minor

Felix Mendelssohn

Mendelssohn (1809-1847) based his sixth and final organ sonata upon the Lutheran hymn Vater unser im Himmelreich (Our Father in Heaven). This fugue based upon the first phrase of the chorale tune concludes the first movement of the sonata.
