Prelude: Selections from In Prayer

This work is a suite of several American folk hymns focused on prayer and reflection. The composer, Neil Harmon (b. 1969), is an organist, composer, and choral conductor with degrees from Brigham Young University and the Eastman School of Music. For 19 years he served as director of the music program at Grace United Methodist Church in Wilmington, Delaware. In 2018 he became a professor of organ at his alma mater BYU.



THE WORD OF GOD

The Old Testament (the people sit)

Isaiah 5:1-7

Let me sing for my beloved my love-song concerning his vineyard:

My beloved had a vineyard on a very fertile hill.

He dug it and cleared it of stones, and planted it with choice vines; he built a watchtower in the midst of it, and hewed out a wine vat in it;

he expected it to yield grapes, but it yielded wild grapes.

And now, inhabitants of Jerusalem and people of Judah, judge between me and my vineyard.

What more was there to do for my vineyard that I have not done in it?

When I expected it to yield grapes, why did it yield wild grapes?

And now I will tell you what I will do to my vineyard.

I will remove its hedge, and it shall be devoured; I will break down its wall, and it shall be trampled down.

I will make it a waste; it shall not be pruned or hoed, and it shall be overgrown with briers and thorns;

I will also command the clouds that they rain no rain upon it.

For the vineyard of the LORD of hosts is the house of Israel, and the people of Judah are his pleasant planting;

he expected justice, but saw bloodshed; righteousness, but heard a cry!

1 Hear, O Shepherd of Israel, leading Joseph like a flock; * shine forth, you that are enthroned upon the cherubim.

- In the presence of Ephraim, Benjamin, and Manasseh, * stir up your strength and come to help us.
- 8 You have brought a vine out of Egypt; * you cast out the nations and planted it.
- 9 You prepared the ground for it; * it took root and filled the land.
- 10 The mountains were covered by its shadow * and the towering cedar trees by its boughs.
- 11 You stretched out its tendrils to the Sea * and its branches to the River.
- 12 Why have you broken down its wall, * so that all who pass by pluck off its grapes?
- 13 The wild boar of the forest has ravaged it, * and the beasts of the field have grazed upon it.
- 14 Turn now, O God of hosts, look down from heaven; behold and tend this vine; * preserve what your right hand has planted.
- 15 They burn it with fire like rubbish; * at the rebuke of your countenance let them perish.
- 16 Let your hand be upon the man of your right hand, * the son of man you have made so strong for yourself.
- 17 And so will we never turn away from you; * give us life, that we may call upon your Name.
- 18 Restore us, O LORD God of hosts; * show the light of your countenance, and we shall be saved.

The New Testament

Hebrews 11:29-12:2

By faith the people passed through the Red Sea as if it were dry land, but when the Egyptians attempted to do so they were drowned. By faith the walls of Jericho fell after they had been encircled for seven days. By faith Rahab the prostitute did not perish with those who were disobedient, because she had received the spies in peace.

And what more should I say? For time would fail me to tell of Gideon, Barak, Samson, Jephthah, of David and Samuel and the prophets – who through faith conquered kingdoms, administered justice, obtained promises, shut the mouths of lions, quenched raging fire, escaped the edge of the sword, won strength out of weakness, became mighty in war, put foreign armies to flight. Women received their dead by resurrection. Others were tortured, refusing to accept release, in order to obtain a better resurrection. Others suffered mocking and flogging, and even chains


and imprisonment. They were stoned to death, they were sawn in two, they were killed by the sword; they went about in skins of sheep and goats, destitute, persecuted, tormented – of whom the world was not worthy. They wandered in deserts and mountains, and in caves and holes in the ground.

Yet all these, though they were commended for their faith, did not receive what was promised, since God had provided something better so that they would not, apart from us, be made perfect.

Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight and the sin that clings so closely, and let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of our faith, who for the sake of the joy that was set before him endured the cross, disregarding its shame, and has taken his seat at the right hand of the throne of God.

Priest The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke. People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

RESPONDING TO THE WORD

The Nicene Creed (leader and people, all standing)

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father.

Most merciful God, we confess that we have sinned against you in thought, word, and deed, by what we have done, and by what we have left undone. We have not loved you with our whole heart; we have not loved our neighbors as ourselves. We are truly sorry and we humbly repent. For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ, have mercy on us and forgive us; that we may delight in your will, and walk in your ways, to the glory of your Name. Amen.

Almighty God have mercy on you, forgive you all your sins through our Lord Jesus Christ, strengthen you in all goodness, and by the power of the Holy Spirit keep you in eternal life. **Amen.**

and pure, your place at the table forever secure. Ask all who hunger to join with you there, for there's room at the banquet and plenty to share.



People We lift them to the Lord.


Celebrant Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. People It is right to give him thanks and praise.

The Celebrant breaks the consecrated Bread.


A period of silence is kept.

John Ness Beck (1930-1986) was born in Warren, Ohio. He earned degrees in English from Ohio State University before serving in the army. It was in the army that he began arranging for music groups. After his service, he returned to Ohio State for degrees in composition. He became a member of the faculty at his alma mater but soon left for a career in music publishing.

Hymn: My Faith Looks Up to Thee

Hymn 691

American pastor Ray Palmer (1808–1887) wrote these words for his own private reflection. In 1831, his friend Lowell Mason (1792–1872) asked Palmer if he had any verses for which Mason could write music. Palmer gave him this text to set and the result became one of the most enduring American hymns.

The Blessing

Recessional Hymn: I Want to Walk as a Child of the Light Hymn 490

Kathleen Thomerson (b. 1934) wrote both the words and music of this hymn in 1966 during a visit to Houston. She earned two music degrees from the University of Texas at Austin, with additional studies at Syracuse University and the Flemish Royal Conservatory in Antwerp. She returned to live in Austin for her retirement.

Postlude: Come, Christians, Join to Sing

This postlude is based on the tune known as Spanish Hymn. The earliest known appearance of this tune was in a choral arrangement by Benjamin Carr (1768–1831) for a concert of the Musical Fund Society of Philadelphia in 1824. Carr had probably learned the tune from his childhood in England. One tradition says that an English regiment pilfered over 100 bottles of wine from a Spanish monastery. They called the celebratory tune they sang afterward a "Spanish Chant."
