Prelude: Savior of the Nations, Come! Lo, How a Rose E'er Blooming

Paul Manz Johannes Brahms

Paul Manz (1919-2009) was a revered American composer for the organ. His most famous works are his chorale preludes. He continued the Lutheran tradition, epitomized by Bach, of adorning the hymn tune with counterpoint that reflects the meaning of the hymn text. Johannes Brahms (1833-1897) prepared a collection of chorale preludes at the end of his life. It was a way for him to pay homage to this rich Lutheran tradition.

Processional Hymn: O Come, O Come, Emmanuel

Hymn 56 (verses 1-3,6)

This hymn has its origin in a series of antiphons for the final week of Advent that arose no later than the 8th century. The second word of each antiphon yields an acrostic, spelling out the letters ERO CRAS: "I shall be present tomorrow." If one antiphon was sung each day, the full text of the acrostic was revealed on the day before Christmas Eve.





THE WORD OF GOD

The Old Testament (the people sit)

Isaiah 11:1-10

A shoot shall come out from the stump of Jesse, and a branch shall grow out of his roots. The spirit of the Lord shall rest on him, the spirit of wisdom and understanding, the spirit of counsel and might, the spirit of knowledge and the fear of the Lord. His delight shall be in the fear of the Lord.

He shall not judge by what his eyes see, or decide by what his ears hear; but with righteousness he shall judge the poor, and decide with equity for the meek of the earth; he shall strike the earth with the rod of his mouth, and with the breath of his lips he shall kill the wicked. Righteousness shall be the belt around his waist, and faithfulness the belt around his loins.

The wolf shall live with the lamb, the leopard shall lie down with the kid, the calf and the lion and the fatling together, and a little child shall lead them. The cow and the bear shall graze, their young shall lie down together; and the lion shall eat straw like the ox. The nursing child shall play over the hole of the asp, and the weaned child shall put its hand on the adder's den. They will not hurt or destroy on all my holy mountain; for the earth will be full of the knowledge of the Lord as the waters cover the sea.

On that day the root of Jesse shall stand as a signal to the peoples; the nations shall inquire of him, and his dwelling shall be glorious.

The New Testament

2 Timothy 4:6-8,16-18

Whatever was written in former days was written for our instruction, so that by steadfastness and by the encouragement of the scriptures we might have hope. May the God of steadfastness and encouragement grant you to live in harmony with one another, in accordance with Christ Jesus, so that together you may with one voice glorify the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Welcome one another, therefore, just as Christ has welcomed you, for the glory of God. For I tell you that Christ has become a servant of the circumcised on behalf of the truth of God in order that he might confirm the promises given to the patriarchs, and in order that the Gentiles might glorify God for his mercy. As it is written,

"Therefore I will confess you among the Gentiles, and sing praises to your name";

and again he says, "Rejoice, O Gentiles, with his people"; and again, "Praise the Lord, all you Gentiles, and let all the peoples praise him"; and again Isaiah says, "The root of Jesse shall come, the one who rises to rule the Gentiles; in him the Gentiles shall hope."

May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that you may abound in hope by the power of the Holy Spirit.

Sequence Hymn: On Jordan's Bank the Baptist's Cry

Hymn 76

This hymn is one of the few to focus on John the Baptist. The text comes from an 18th-century French breviary and was translated to English for a 19th-century Anglican hymnal. This version was paired with a rousing tune that has been a favorite of the English church ever since.

The Gospel Matthew 24:36-44

Priest The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

In those days John the Baptist appeared in the wilderness of Judea, proclaiming, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near." This is the one of whom the prophet Isaiah spoke when he said, "The voice of one crying out in the wilderness: 'Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight."

Now John wore clothing of camel's hair with a leather belt around his waist, and his food was locusts and wild honey. Then the people of Jerusalem and all Judea were going out to him, and all the region along the Jordan, and they were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins.

But when he saw many Pharisees and Sadducees coming for baptism, he said to them, "You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the wrath to come? Bear fruit worthy of repentance. Do not presume to say to yourselves, 'We have Abraham as our ancestor'; for I tell you, God is able from these stones to raise up children to Abraham. Even now the ax is lying at the root of the trees; every tree therefore that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire.

"I baptize you with water for repentance, but one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to carry his sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowing fork is in his hand, and he will clear his threshing floor and will gather his wheat into the granary; but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire."

Offertory: There's a Voice in the Wilderness Crying

arr. Craig Phillips


There's a voice in the wilderness crying, a call from the ways untrod: prepare in the desert a highway, a highway for our God! The valleys shall be exalted, the lofty hills brought low; make straight all the crooked places where the Lord our God may go! O Zion, that bringest good tidings, get thee up to the heights and sing! Proclaim to a desolate people the coming of their King. Like the flowers of the field they perish, like grass our works decay, the power and pomp of nations shall pass like a dream away; but the word of our God endureth, the arm of the Lord is strong, he stands in the midst of nations, and he will right the wrong. He shall feed his flock like a shepherd, the lambs he'll gently hold; to pastures of peace he'll lead them, and bring them safe to his fold.

Canadian poet and journalist James Milligan (1876–1961) wrote these words in 1925, based on passages from Isaiah that Christians associate with John the Baptist. British-Canadian organist Henry Hugh Bancroft (1904-1988) wrote a tune to fit Milligan's poem. This arrangement was prepared by American organist Craig Phillips (b. 1961).





And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us.



The Breaking of the Bread


The Celebrant breaks the consecrated Bread.

This text comes from a German hymnal published in 1700. Our hymnal pairs it with a tune "collected" in Wales by late 19th-century hymnal editors. Unusually, they heard it being sung in both the major and minor modes.

Hymn 67

This poem was written by Johann Olearius (1611-1684), a Lutheran pastor and teacher at the University of Wittenberg. The English translation was made by Catherine Winkworth (1827-1878), an influential figure in the 19th-century English Church. The tune comes from the 16th-century Genevan Psalter.

Recessional Hymn: Hail to the Lord's Anointed

The author of this paraphrase of Psalm 72, James Montgomery (1771–1854) began writing poetry at age 10. Despite flunking out of school at 14, he found a job in 1792 at a radical weekly newspaper, the Sheffield (England) Register. He eventually served for 31 years as its editor, during which he was a supporter of social justice. He was jailed twice for his radical views, using the time in prison to write poetry.
