Prelude: Two Noëls

Jean-François Dandrieu & Louis-Claude Daquin

These works present variations upon songs that would have been sung at Christmas festivals in 18th-century France. Dandrieu (1682–1738) was a gifted and precocious child, he gave his first public performances when he was 5 years old, playing the harpsichord for King Louis XIV and his court. Daquin (1694–1772) impressed the same king with his youthful keyboard skills. Both eventually took up posts as organists at prestigious Parisian churches and in the Chapelle Royale.

This Christmas carol by Scottish poet James Montgomery (1771–1854) was printed in the Christmas Eve edition of an English newspaper in 1816. It gained in popularity, and was being sung in churches by 1825.

THE WORD OF GOD

The Old Testament (the people sit)

I will greatly rejoice in the LORD, my whole being shall exult in my God;

The New Testament

Galatians 3:23-25; 4:4-7

Now before faith came, we were imprisoned and guarded under the law until faith would be revealed. Therefore the law was our disciplinarian until Christ came, so that we might be justified by faith. But now that faith has come, we are no longer subject to a disciplinarian.

But when the fullness of time had come, God sent his Son, born of a woman, born under the law, in order to redeem those who were under the law, so that we might receive adoption as children. And because you are children, God has sent the Spirit of his Son into our hearts, crying, "Abba! Father!" So you are no longer a slave but a child, and if a child then also an heir, through God.

John Wesley Work, Jr. (1871–1925) was the first African-American editor of folk songs and spirituals; and also a choral director, educator, and songwriter. He transcribed and disseminated this Spiritual, which dates back to at least 1865. This version was further adapted by his son, musicologist and scholar John Wesley Work III (1901–1967).

The Gospel

John 1:1-18

Priest The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.

There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world.

He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him. He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God.

And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth. (John testified to him and cried out, "This was he of whom I said, 'He who comes after me ranks ahead of me because he was before me.'") From his fullness we have all received, grace upon grace. The law indeed was given through Moses; grace and truth came through Jesus Christ. No one has ever seen God. It is God the only Son, who is close to the Father's heart, who has made him known.

For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ, have mercy on us and forgive us; that we may delight in your will, and walk in your ways, to the glory of your Name. Amen.

Almighty God have mercy on you, forgive you all your sins through our Lord Jesus Christ, strengthen you in all goodness, and by the power of the Holy Spirit keep you in eternal life. **Amen.**

Offertory: Prelude on the Sussex Carol


Russell Schulz-Widmar

Now familiar from its opening lyrics "On Christmas night all Christians sing," the Sussex Carol was not widely known until about 100 years ago. The words were first published in 1684, but it was not until 1919 that composers Cecil Sharp and Ralph Vaughan Williams first wrote down, independently, the lilting melody. The latter heard the carol sung by Mrs. Harriet Verall of Monk's Gate in Sussex—hence the title.






The Celebrant proceeds

The Celebrant continues



The Lord's Prayer


And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,

The Breaking of the Bread


The Celebrant breaks the consecrated Bread.

Recessional Hymn: Good Christian Friends, Rejoice

The Oxford Movement of 19th-century England resurrected many ancient Greek and Latin hymns and translated them for modern use. The chief proponent of this movement was John Mason Neale (1818–1866). The original carol was in two languages, Latin and German. A literal translation of the original text begins, "In sweet jubilation, now sing and be joyful." For this reason, the tune is known as In Dulci Jubilo.

Alfred Fedak

Charles Wesley's (1707–1788) original version of this carol began, "Hark! how all the welkin rings glory to the King of Kings." For this text, he requested and received slow and solemn music. One hundred years later, Felix Mendelssohn (1809–1847) wrote a cantata to mark the 400th anniversary of Gutenberg's printing press. A rousing tune from this 19th-century cantata was paired with an adaptation of Wesley's 18th-century words, and the resulting Christmas carol achieved lasting popularity.
