Covid Protocols: We ask that everyone ages two and older wear a mask over their nose and mouth while indoors regardless of vaccination status. GATHERING

Prelude: Four 18th-Century English Voluntaries

The voluntary is a distinctly English organ piece performed before, during, or after a church service. The term, which derives from the word's definition "free, i.e. not forced to do something" was applied to musical improvisations and came to be attached to the organ music played following the service. The 18th-century voluntary was free in style and usually consisted of two or more polyphonic sections. These voluntaries were composed by Thomas Arne (1710-1778), William Boyce (1711-1779), Samuel Wesley (1766-1837), and William Walond (1719-1768).

Processional Hymn: Thy Strong Word Did Cleave the Darkness Hymn 381

Lutheran theologian Martin Franzmann (1907-1976) wrote this text for Concordia Seminary in St. Louis. It was used annually as the processional hymn for their commencement ceremony. The text was written to be paired with the familiar Welsh tune Ton-Y-Botel. This name (The Bottle Tune) is the result of a fanciful story that the tune had been discovered washed up in a bottle on the North Wales coast. In reality, it was composed in 1896 by Thomas John Williams (1869-1944).



THE WORD OF GOD

The Old Testament (the people sit)

Isaiah 6:1-8

In the year that King Uzziah died, I saw the Lord sitting on a throne, high and lofty; and the hem of his robe filled the temple. Seraphs were in attendance above him; each had six wings: with two they covered their faces, and with two they covered their feet, and with two they flew. And one called to another and said:

"Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of hosts; the whole earth is full of his glory."

The pivots on the thresholds shook at the voices of those who called, and the house filled with smoke. And I said: "Woe is me! I am lost, for I am a man of unclean lips, and I live among a people of unclean lips; yet my eyes have seen the King, the Lord of hosts!"

Then one of the seraphs flew to me, holding a live coal that had been taken from the altar with a pair of tongs. The seraph touched my mouth with it and said: "Now that this has touched your lips, your guilt has departed and your sin is blotted out." Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying, "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" And I said, "Here am I; send me!"

Psalm 138 Confitebor tibi

- 1 I will give thanks to you, O LORD, with my whole heart; * before the gods I will sing your praise.
- 2 I will bow down toward your holy temple and praise your Name, * because of your love and faithfulness;
- 3 For you have glorified your Name * and your word above all things.
- 4 When I called, you answered me; * you increased my strength within me.
- 5 All the kings of the earth will praise you, O LORD, * when they have heard the words of your mouth.
- 6 They will sing of the ways of the LORD, * that great is the glory of the LORD.

- 7 Though the LORD be high, he cares for the lowly; * he perceives the haughty from afar.
- 8 Though I walk in the midst of trouble, you keep me safe; * you stretch forth your hand against the fury of my enemies; your right hand shall save me.
- 9 The LORD will make good his purpose for me; * O LORD, your love endures for ever; do not abandon the works of your hands.

The New Testament

1 Corinthians 15:1-11

I would remind you, brothers and sisters, of the good news that I proclaimed to you, which you in turn received, in which also you stand, through which also you are being saved, if you hold firmly to the message that I proclaimed to you – unless you have come to believe in vain.

For I handed on to you as of first importance what I in turn had received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the scriptures, and that he was buried, and that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the scriptures, and that he appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve. Then he appeared to more than five hundred brothers and sisters at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have died. Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles. Last of all, as to one untimely born, he appeared also to me. For I am the least of the apostles, unfit to be called an apostle, because I persecuted the church of God. But by the grace of God I am what I am, and his grace toward me has not been in vain. On the contrary, I worked harder than any of them – though it was not I, but the grace of God that is with me. Whether then it was I or they, so we proclaim and so you have come to believe.

Sequence Hymn: Come, Thou Fount of Every Blessing

Hymn 686

This hymn was written by an 18th-century British Baptist pastor. In America, it is sung to the tune Nettleton, published in John Wyeth's 1820 Repository of Sacred Music. This collection is an example of American folk hymns similar in style to those found in Southern Harmony and The Sacred Harp.

The Gospel

Luke 5:1-11

Priest The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke. People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Once while Jesus was standing beside the lake of Gennesaret, and the crowd was pressing in on him to hear the word of God, he saw two boats there at the shore of the lake; the fishermen had gone out of them and were washing their nets. He got into one of the boats, the one belonging to Simon, and asked him to put out a little way from the shore. Then he sat down and taught the crowds from the boat. When he had finished speaking, he said to Simon, "Put out into the deep water and let down your nets for a catch." Simon answered, "Master, we have worked all night long but have caught nothing. Yet if you say so, I will let down the nets." When they had done this, they caught so many fish that their nets were beginning to break. So they signaled their partners in the other boat to come and help them. And they came and filled both boats, so that they began to sink. But when Simon Peter saw it, he fell down at Jesus' knees, saying, "Go away from me, Lord, for I am a sinful man!" For he and all who were with him were amazed at the catch of fish that they had taken; and so also were James and John, sons of Zebedee, who were partners with Simon. Then Jesus said to Simon, "Do not be afraid; from now on you will be catching people." When they had brought their boats to shore, they left everything and followed him.

We have not loved you with our whole heart; we have not loved our neighbors as ourselves. We are truly sorry and we humbly repent. For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ, have mercy on us and forgive us; that we may delight in your will, and walk in your ways, to the glory of your Name. Amen.

Almighty God have mercy on you, forgive you all your sins through our Lord Jesus Christ, strengthen you in all goodness, and by the power of the Holy Spirit keep you in eternal life. Amen.

Ralph Vaughn Williams




In this 1934 anthem, British composer Vaughan Williams (1872-1958) combines texts from two different psalms, followed by a stanza from a well-known hymn. The anthem begins with a setting of words from Psalm 84. After this, Vaughan Williams incorporates the last verse of Psalm 90. To conclude the anthem, he adds a stanza from Hymn 680, "O God, Our Help in Ages Past." This hymn by Isaac Watts (1674-1748) is itself a paraphrase of Psalm 90.

Eucharistic Prayer B






The Celebrant proceeds

The Lord's Prayer


And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,

The Breaking of the Bread


The Celebrant breaks the consecrated Bread.



Author Philip Doddridge (1702-1751) was a nonconformist English pastor and teacher who served his flock selflessly despite suffering from tuberculosis. He was beloved by his colleagues for "his wide sympathies and gentle, unaffected goodness." This beautiful hymn is an invitation to all people to feast at God's table.

Each stanza of this discipleship hymn by American composer Dan Schutte (b. 1947) ends with God's question: "Whom shall I send?" The refrain quotes the faithful voice

of the child Samuel: "I have heard you calling in the night." This gives us faith to sing, "I will go...if you lead me."

Théodore Salomé

Théodore-César Salomé (1834-1896) was a French organist and composer. In Paris, he served at the Église de la Sainte-Trinité. His obituary said that, "He had much talent and was an artist of high rank. M. Salomé was of a retiring disposition, but with a most amiable and attractive manner that made one feel at once that he was their friend." "Grand Chœur" is a musical instruction to use the full resources of the organ in performance.
