Prelude: from Suite Gothique

Léon Boëllmann

Introduction-Chorale, Menuet gothique, & Prière à Notre-Dame

Boëllmann (1862–1897) was a French composer mostly remembered today for a small but stunning body of work for the organ. He won numerous prizes and was highly-regarded by his contemporaries before his death from tuberculosis at the age of 35. The 1895 Suite Gothique is the most well-known of his works.

Processional Hymn: When Morning Gilds the Skies

Hymn 427

This anonymous German Catholic hymn was translated for use in English hymnals during the 19th century. It is rare for a hymn tune to be composed for a specific text, but English composer Joseph Barnby (1838–1896) wrote this music with these words in mind.







THE WORD OF GOD

The Old Testament (the people sit)

Jeremiah 29:1, 4-7

These are the words of the letter that the prophet Jeremiah sent from Jerusalem to the remaining elders among the exiles, and to the priests, the prophets, and all the people, whom Nebuchadnezzar had taken into exile from Jerusalem to Babylon.

Thus says the LORD of hosts, the God of Israel, to all the exiles whom I have sent into exile from Jerusalem to Babylon: Build houses and live in them; plant gardens and eat what they produce. Take wives and have sons and daughters; take wives for your sons, and give your daughters in marriage, that they may bear sons and daughters; multiply there, and do not decrease. But seek the welfare of the city where I have sent you into exile, and pray to the LORD on its behalf, for in its welfare you will find your welfare.

The New Testament

Timothy 2:8-15

Remember Jesus Christ, raised from the dead, a descendant of David-- that is my gospel, for which I suffer hardship, even to the point of being chained like a criminal. But the word of God is not chained. Therefore I endure everything for the sake of the elect, so that they may also obtain the salvation that is in Christ Jesus, with eternal glory. The saying is sure:

If we have died with him, we will also live with him; if we endure, we will also reign with him; if we deny him, he will also deny us; if we are faithless, he remains faithful-for he cannot deny himself.

Remind them of this, and warn them before God that they are to avoid wrangling over words, which does no good but only ruins those who are listening. Do your best to present yourself to God as one approved by him, a worker who has no need to be ashamed, rightly explaining the word of truth.

Sequence: Fairest Lord Jesus

Hymn 383

Many scholars think that this hymn was first sung by followers of John Hus (1369–1415), who were driven out of Bohemia in 1620 in an anti-Reformation purge, and then settled in a part of Poland. They had to keep their faith secret, yet had a strong tradition of hymn singing. The hymn is most frequently paired with the 19th-century German tune we will sing today.

The Gospel Luke 17:11-19

On the way to Jerusalem Jesus was going through the region between Samaria and Galilee. As he entered a village, ten lepers approached him. Keeping their distance, they called out, saying, "Jesus, Master, have mercy on us!" When he saw them, he said to them, "Go and show yourselves to the priests." And as

they went, they were made clean. Then one of them, when he saw that he was healed, turned back, praising God with a loud voice. He prostrated himself at Jesus' feet and thanked him. And he was a Samaritan. Then Jesus asked, "Were not ten made clean? But the other nine, where are they? Was none of them found to return and give praise to God except this foreigner?" Then he said to him, "Get up and go on your way; your faith has made you well."

Communion Music:

Hymn: Thine Arm, O Lord, in Days of Old Hymn 567

Edward Hayes Plumptre (1821-1891) was an Anglican priest, scholar, and theologian. His text first recalls God's healing grace from the pages of scripture. The final stanza is a prayer for God's healing and deliverance to come into our lives today.

Hymn: Father, We Thank Thee Who Hast Planted Hymn 302

F. Bland Tucker (1895-1984) created this hymn by translating an ancient Greek text. The son of a bishop and brother of a Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church, he was ordained deacon in 1918, and priest in 1920, after having served in France during World War I. His theological wisdom and poetic skill were put to good use on the committees which produced both the 1940 and the 1982 hymnals.

The Blessing

Recessional Hymn: Now Thank We All Our God Hymn 397

This German hymn of thanks transcends all national, language, and denominational boundaries. It originated in the havoc of the Thirty Years War and was sung to celebrate the Peace of Westphalia in 1648. Its author, Martin Rinckart (1586–1649), was an accomplished musician who studied at the University of Leipzig and spent most of his career as a musician and archdeacon in the city of Eilenburg.
