

The Old Testament (the people sit)

Jeremiah 31:7-14

Thus says the LORD:

Sing aloud with gladness for Jacob, and raise shouts for the chief of the nations;

proclaim, give praise, and say,

the remnant of Israel."

See, I am going to bring them from the land of the north, and gather them from the farthest parts of the earth,

The New Testament

Ephesians 1:3-6,15-19a

Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us in Christ with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places, just as he chose us in Christ before the foundation of the world to be holy and blameless before him in love. He destined us for adoption as his children through Jesus Christ, according to the good pleasure of his will, to the praise of his glorious grace that he freely bestowed on us in the Beloved.

I have heard of your faith in the Lord Jesus and your love toward all the saints, and for this reason I do not cease to give thanks for you as I remember you in my prayers. Sequence Hymn: God Rest You Merry, Gentlemen

This English carol was first published in 1770, although it was likely sung much earlier. In their original context, the phrase "God rest you merry" meant "God keep you merry."

The Gospel Luke 2:41-52

Priest The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

The parents of Jesus went to Jerusalem every year for the festival of the Passover. And when he was twelve years old, they went up as usual for the festival. When the festival was ended and they started to return, the boy Jesus stayed behind in Jerusalem, but his parents did not know it. Assuming that he was in the group of travelers, they went a day's journey. Then they started to look for him among their relatives and friends. When they did not find him, they returned to Jerusalem to search for him. After three days they found him in the temple, sitting among the teachers, listening to them and asking them questions. And all who heard him were amazed at his understanding and his answers. When his parents saw him they were astonished; and his mother said to him, "Child, why have you treated us like this? Look, your father and I have been searching for you in great anxiety." He said to them, "Why were you searching for me? Did you not know that I must be in my Father's house?" But they did not understand what he said to them. Then he went down with them and came to Nazareth, and was obedient to them. His mother treasured all these things in her heart.

RESPONDING TO THE WORD

The Nicene Creed (leader and people, all standing)

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ, have mercy on us and forgive us; that we may delight in your will, and walk in your ways, to the glory of your Name. Amen.

Almighty God have mercy on you, forgive you all your sins through our Lord Jesus Christ, strengthen you in all goodness, and by the power of the Holy Spirit keep you in eternal life. **Amen.**


EATING TOGETHER

James Biery


The French carol upon which this offertory is based was written by Bernard de La Monnoye (1641–1728) and first published in Noël bourguignons in 1720. The carol revolves around the birth of Jesus, and is told from the perspective of shepherds playing instruments—flutes and drums—the onomatopoeic sound of which gives the song its name; "patapan" is meant to mimic the sound of the drum, and an accompanying lyric, "tu-re-lu-re-lu," the flute.

Recessional Hymn: We Three Kings

Hymn 128

This carol was composed by John Henry Hopkins Jr. (1792–1868), the first Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Vermont and the eighth Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church. Its original use was for an elaborate Nativity drama he was staging. The carol tells the story of Jesus' birth, death, and resurrection; and the melody alternates between regal, minor mode verses, in which the Wise Men announce what gifts they're presenting, and a major mode chorus joyfully proclaiming the beauty of the star guiding their way.

Postlude: How Bright Appears the Morning Star Johann Pachelbel

This setting of Hymn 497 is one of many chorale preludes written by Johann Pachelbel (1653–1706). A prominent German organist and composer, Pachelbel represents the pinnacle of the South German organ tradition during the Baroque era. As one of the last composers of the mid-Baroque, he influenced the work of later composers such as J. S. Bach.
