Prelude: Two Settings "How Bright Appears the Morning Star" Paul Manz Leon R. Smith, Jr.

Paul Manz (1919-2009) was an American composer for choir and organ. His most famous organ works are his volumes of neo-Baroque chorale preludes. Texas native, Dr. Leon R. Smith, Jr., was for many years professor of music theory, composition, and electronic music at the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point. His son, Ross Smith, sings in the St. Mark's Choir.

## Processional Hymn: As With Gladness Men of Old

Hymn 119

William Chatterton Dix (1837-1898) was an English writer of hymns and carols. At the age of 29 he was struck with a near fatal illness and consequently suffered months confined to his bed. During this time he became severely depressed. Yet it was during this period that many of his hymns, including "As With Gladness Men of Old," were written..

# The Word of God

### The Old Testament (the people sit)

Isaiah 42:1-9

Here is my servant, whom I uphold, my chosen, in whom my soul delights; I have put my spirit upon him; he will bring forth justice to the nations. He will not cry or lift up his voice, or make it heard in the street; a bruised reed he will not break, and a dimly burning wick he will not quench; he will faithfully bring forth justice. He will not grow faint or be crushed until he has established justice in the earth; and the coastlands wait for his teaching. Thus says God, the Lord, who created the heavens and stretched them out, who spread out the earth and what comes from it, who gives breath to the people upon it and spirit to those who walk in it:

I am the Lord, I have called you in righteousness, I have taken you by the hand and kept you; I have given you as a covenant to the people, a light to the nations, to open the eyes that are blind, to bring out the prisoners from the dungeon, from the prison those who sit in darkness.

I am the Lord, that is my name; my glory I give to no other, nor my praise to idols. See, the former things have come to pass, and new things I now declare; before they spring forth, I tell you of them.

#### The New Testament

Acts 10:34-43

Peter began to speak to them: "I truly understand that God shows no partiality but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ--he is Lord of all. That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced: how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. He commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead. All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name."

# Sequence Hymn: Christ, When for Us You Were Baptized Hymn 121

F. Bland Tucker (1895-1984) wrote these words in 1979. The son of a bishop and brother of a Presiding bishop of the Episcopal Church, from 1925 to 1945 he served as rector of historic St. John's Church, Georgetown, Washington, D.C. Then until his retirement in 1967 he was rector of John Wesley's parish in Georgia, the Old Christ Church, Savannah.

Priest The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus came from Galilee to John at the Jordan, to be baptized by him. John would have prevented him, saying, "I need to be baptized by you, and do you come to me?" But Jesus answered him, "Let it be so now; for it is proper for us in this way to fulfill all righteousness." Then he consented. And when Jesus had been baptized, just as he came up from the water, suddenly the heavens were opened to him and he saw the Spirit of God descending like a dove and alighting on him. And a voice from heaven said, "This is my Son, the Beloved, with whom I am well pleased."

Offertory Anthem: What Star Is This?


15th-Century Carol arr. David Ashley White




The Celebrant proceeds

And lead us not into temptation,


but deliver us from evil.



These words were written by Anglican Archdeacon George Boorne Timms (1910-1997). In addition to hymns, he wrote liturgical manuals and theological articles.

### Recessional Hymn: Earth Has Many a Noble City

Aurelius Clemens Prudentius was a provincial Roman governor in modern day Spain. In 405 AD, he published a number of Latin Christian prayers and hymns in a book which included "O sola magnarum urbium." In 1849, English Catholic priest Edward Caswall made the translation we will sing today.
