Prelude: Three Baroque Voluntaries

Rondeau Air and Gigue Allegro Élisabeth Jacquet de La Guerre Elizabeth Turner Anna Bon

Élisabeth Jacquet de La Guerre (1665-1729) was a French harpsichordist and organist for the court of Louis XIV. She was a prolific composer of chamber music, vocal works, and opera. Very little is known about British composer Elizabeth Turner (1700-1756) apart from the fact that several of her songs and keyboard compositions were included alongside works of Boyce and Handel in contemporary collections. Italian composer Anna Bon (1738-c. 1769) wrote numerous sonatas, chamber music, vocal and choral works, and an opera.

Hymn 401

Shaped by its traditional Jewish tune, this selection of English stanzas conveys the essence of the Yigdal, a canticle based on a medieval Hebrew statement of faith about the nature of God and often used in synagogue worship.



THE WORD OF GOD

The Old Testament (the people sit)

Amos 8:1-12

This is what the Lord GOD showed me – a basket of summer fruit. He said, "Amos, what do you see?" And I said, "A basket of summer fruit." Then the LORD said to me,

"The end has come upon my people Israel;

I will never again pass them by.

The songs of the temple shall become wailings in that day," says the Lord GOD;

"the dead bodies shall be many, cast out in every place. Be silent!"

Hear this, you that trample on the needy, and bring to ruin the poor of the land,

saying, "When will the new moon be over so that we may sell grain; and the sabbath, so that we may offer wheat for sale?

- 9 I will give you thanks for what you have done * and declare the goodness of your Name in the presence of the godly.


Christ Jesus is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation; for in him all things in heaven and on earth were created, things visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or powers – all things have been created through him and for him. He himself is before all things, and in him all things hold together. He is the head of the body, the church; he is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead, so that he might come to have first place in everything. For in him all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, and through him God was pleased to reconcile to himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, by making peace through the blood of his cross.

And you who were once estranged and hostile in mind, doing evil deeds, he has now reconciled in his fleshly body through death, so as to present you holy and blameless and irreproachable before him – provided that you continue securely established and steadfast in the faith, without shifting from the hope promised by the gospel that you heard, which has been proclaimed to every creature under heaven. I, Paul, became a servant of this gospel.

I am now rejoicing in my sufferings for your sake, and in my flesh I am completing what is lacking in Christ's afflictions for the sake of his body, that is, the church. I became its servant according to God's commission that was given to me for you, to make the word of God fully known, the mystery that has been hidden throughout the ages and generations but has now been revealed to his saints. To them God chose to make known how great among the Gentiles are the riches of the glory of this mystery, which is Christ in you, the hope of glory. It is he whom we proclaim, warning everyone and teaching everyone in all wisdom, so that we may present everyone mature in Christ.

RESPONDING TO THE WORD

The Nicene Creed (leader and people, all standing)

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made.

For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven:

by the power of the Holy Spirit

he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate;

he suffered death and was buried.

On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father.

He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son.

With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified.

He has spoken through the Prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church.

We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins.

We look for the resurrection of the dead. and the life of the world to come. Amen.

We have not loved you with our whole heart; we have not loved our neighbors as ourselves. We are truly sorry and we humbly repent. For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ, have mercy on us and forgive us; that we may delight in your will, and walk in your ways, to the glory of your Name. Amen.

Almighty God have mercy on you, forgive you all your sins through our Lord Jesus Christ, strengthen you in all goodness, and by the power of the Holy Spirit keep you in eternal life. **Amen.**


Soprano and Alto Ensemble



For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.


The Breaking of the Bread

The Rev. Charles Price (1920-1999) was educated at Harvard University, Virginia Theological Seminary, and Union Seminary. While an Episcopal priest in Pittsburgh, he wrote this text (based upon a 19th-century poem) to be paired with the German chorale Werde Munter, better known as the tune of "Jesu, Joy of Man's Desiring."

Hymn: Seek Ye First the Kingdom of God

This song was written by Karen Lafferty in 1971, following a Bible study on Matthew 6. Lafferty (b. 1948) is a Christian songwriter and folk musician who gained worldwide influence through her musical leadership at Calvary Chapel in Costa Mesa, California. One of the 50 largest churches in America, it is also the "mother church" for over a thousand international congregations.
