Prelude: Andante in F Major

Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart

Although Mozart (1756–1791) was an accomplished organist, he left behind no large-scale compositions for the instrument. He did, however, write some beautiful pieces for "clockwork organs" that have been transcribed for performance by human hands. Mozart wrote out the notes for this piece so that a builder could create a pinned barrel (like a music box), allowing a clockwork mechanism to send air through the correct pipes of a small "playerless" organ.

Processional Hymn: Holy, Holy, Holy! Lord God Almighty! Hymn 362

Much of the imagery of this hymn comes from Revelation 4:2-11, which its author, an Anglican bishop, developed into a hymn of praise to the Trinity. The tune, written specifically for this text, reinforces the Trinitarian theme by emphasizing the three notes of an ascending D major triad.



The Nicene Creed (leader and people, all standing)

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ,
the only Son of God,
eternally begotten of the Father,
God from God, Light from Light,
true God from true God,
begotten, not made,
of one Being with the Father.
Through him all things were made.

he came down from heaven:
by the power of the Holy Spirit
he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary,

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate;
he suffered death and was buried.

We have not loved you with our whole heart; we have not loved our neighbors as ourselves. We are truly sorry and we humbly repent. For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ, have mercy on us and forgive us; that we may delight in your will, and walk in your ways, to the glory of your Name. Amen.

Almighty God have mercy on you, forgive you all your sins through our Lord Jesus Christ, strengthen you in all goodness, and by the power of the Holy Spirit keep you in eternal life. **Amen.**

Offertory Solo: In diesen heil'gen Hallen Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart



People We lift them to the Lord.


Celebrant Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give him thanks and praise.

The Celebrant breaks the consecrated Bread.


A period of silence is kept.

Communion Hymn: Let All Mortal Flesh Keep Silence

Hymn 324

The flowering of Anglican hymnody in the 19th century included the rediscovery and translation of ancient hymns, such as this text from one of the earliest Christian liturgies. The Divine Liturgy of St. James is thought to have originated in the 4th century. It continues to be used in parts of the Eastern Church. A 17th-century French tune is paired with this ancient text.

The Post Communion Prayer

After Communion, the Celebrant says

Almighty and everliving God, we thank you for feeding us with the spiritual food of the most precious Body and Blood

of your Son our Savior Jesus Christ; and for assuring us in these holy mysteries that we are living members of the Body of your Son, and heirs of your eternal kingdom. To him, to you, and to the Holy Spirit, be honor and glory, now and for ever. Amen.

The Blessing

Recessional Hymn: Holy Father, Great Creator

Hymn 368

Henry Thomas Smart (1813-1879) was an English organist and composer. After studying law, he decided to quit university and focus on music. He served at several prominent London parishes, and also worked as an organ designer. Though highly rated as a composer by his English contemporaries, Smart is now largely forgotten, save for this hymn tune.

Grayston Ives

Grayston Ives (b. 1948) is a British composer, singer, organist, and choral conductor. As a young boy he sang with the choir of Ely Cathedral. During the 1980s he sang with John Rutter and The King's Singers. Before his retirement in 2009, he was Organist of Magdalen College, Oxford. This piece opens with a brilliant, cinematic flourish. It quickly settles into a lighthearted march. After a crescendo to full organ, the opening material returns, and the piece concludes in dramatic fashion.


