

Come, Holy Ghost, our souls inspire, and lighten with celestial fire. Thou the anointing Spirit art, who dost thy sevenfold gifts impart. Thy blessed unction from above is comfort, life, and fire of love. Enable with perpetual light the dullness of our blinded sight. Anoint and cheer our soiled face with the abundance of thy grace. Keep far our foes, give peace at home: where thou art guide no ill can come. Teach us to know the Father, Son, and thee, of both, to be but One, that through the ages all along, this may be our endless song: praise to thy eternal merit, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

"Veni Creator Spiritus" is a chant that dates back to at least the 9th century. It has traditionally been sung at Pentecost and liturgies invoking the presence of the Holy Spirit. French organist and composer Maurice Duruflé (1902–1986) wrote this set of variations on the chant in 1926.

Processional Hymn: Hail Thee, Festival Day!

Processional hymns have a long tradition in the church, especially during the Middle Ages. Venantius Fortunatus (c. 530-609) wrote this Latin hymn for Pentecost that connects our celebration with those of Christians 1500 years ago. The ancient text soars because of a fine English translation and the masterful music by Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872–1958).



THE WORD OF GOD

The Old Testament (the people sit)

Genesis 11:1-9

Now the whole earth had one language and the same words. And as they migrated from the east, they came upon a plain in the land of Shinar and settled there. And they said to one another, "Come, let us make bricks, and burn them thoroughly." And they had brick for stone, and bitumen for mortar. Then they said, "Come, let us build ourselves a city, and a tower with its top in the heavens, and let us make a name for ourselves; otherwise we shall be scattered abroad upon the face of the whole earth." The LORD came down to see the city and the tower, which mortals had built. And the LORD said, "Look, they are one people, and they have all one language; and this is only the beginning of what they will do; nothing that they propose to do will now be impossible for them. Come, let us go down, and confuse their language there, so that they will not understand one another's speech." So the LORD scattered them abroad from there over the face of all the earth, and they left off building the city. Therefore it was called Babel, because there the LORD confused the language of all the earth; and from there the LORD scattered them abroad over the face of all the earth.

When the day of Pentecost had come, the disciples were all together in one place. And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability.

Now there were devout Jews from every nation under heaven living in Jerusalem. And at this sound the crowd gathered and was bewildered, because each one heard them speaking in the native language of each. Amazed and astonished, they asked, "Are not all these who are speaking Galileans? And how is it that we hear, each of us, in our own native language? Parthians, Medes, Elamites, and residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene, and visitors from Rome, both Jews and proselytes, Cretans and Arabs – in our own languages we hear them speaking about God's deeds of power." All were amazed and perplexed, saying to one another, "What does this mean?" But others sneered and said, "They are filled with new wine."

But Peter, standing with the eleven, raised his voice and addressed them, "Men of Judea and all who live in Jerusalem, let this be known to you, and listen to what I say. Indeed, these are not drunk, as you suppose, for it is only nine o'clock in the morning. No, this is what was spoken through the prophet Joel:

'In the last days it will be, God declares,

that I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh, and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy,

and your young men shall see visions, and your old men shall dream dreams.

Even upon my slaves, both men and women, in those days I will pour out my Spirit; and they shall prophesy.

And I will show portents in the heaven above and signs on the earth below, blood, and fire, and smoky mist.

The sun shall be turned to darkness and the moon to blood, before the coming of the Lord's great and glorious day.

Then everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved."

Sequence Hymn: Come Down, O Love Divine

Hymn 516

This lauda spirituale, a kind of vernacular Italian sacred song from the late Middle Ages and Renaissance, was translated into English in the 19th century but received little notice until Vaughan Williams wrote this tune for it. The tune's name, DOWN AMPNEY, refers to the composer's birthplace.

The Gospel John 14:8-17

Priest The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.
People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Philip said to Jesus, "Lord, show us the Father, and we will be satisfied." Jesus said to him, "Have I been with you all this time, Philip, and you still do not know me? Whoever has seen me has seen the Father. How can you say, 'Show us the Father'? Do you not believe that I am in the Father and the Father is in me? The words that I say to you I do not speak on my own; but the Father who dwells in me does his works. Believe me that I am in the Father and the Father is in me; but if you do not, then believe me because of the works themselves. Very truly, I tell you, the one who believes in me will also do the works that I do and, in fact, will do greater works than these, because I am going to the Father. I will do whatever you ask in my name, so that the Father may be glorified in the Son. If in my name you ask me for anything, I will do it.

"If you love me, you will keep my commandments. And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Advocate, to be with you forever. This is the Spirit of truth, whom the world cannot receive, because it neither sees him nor knows him. You know him, because he abides with you, and he will be in you."




The Celebrant proceeds

The Lord's Prayer


And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,



Communion Anthem: Come, Thou Fount of Every Blessing arr. Joe Cox

Come, thou fount of every blessing, tune my heart to sing thy grace! Streams of mercy, never ceasing, call for songs of loudest praise. Teach me some melodious sonnet, sung by flaming tongues above. Praise the mount! I'm fixed upon it, mount of God's redeeming love. Here I find my greatest treasure; hither by thy help, I've come; and I hope, by thy good pleasure, safely to arrive at home. Jesus sought me when a stranger, wandering from the fold of God; he, to rescue me from danger, interposed his precious blood. Oh, to grace how great a debtor daily I'm constrained to be! Let thy goodness like a fetter, bind my wandering heart to thee; prone to wander, Lord I feel it, prone to leave the God I love; here's my heart, oh, take and seal it; seal it for thy courts above.

Joe Cox (b. 1954) has degrees in music, business, and theology from Austin College in Sherman, Texas. After graduation he joined the staff of "The United Methodist Reporter" in Dallas, working in the editorial offices while attending Perkins School of Theology at Southern Methodist University. Since 1991, he has lived in New Mexico. In addition to numerous sacred compositions, he has worked for major motion pictures and with country artists like Kenny Chesney. His Mass settings were featured at the 2006 Episcopal General Convention in Columbus, Ohio.

The Blessing

Recessional Hymn: Spread, O Spread, Thou Mighty Word Hymn 530

The origins of this hymn demonstrate the collaborative process that produces much of our hymnody. The source material is a German poem written by a Lutheran pastor, J. F. Bahnmaier (1774-1841). It was translated by two Episcopal clergy from the first half of the 20th century. It was further revised, with a new final stanza, for our current hymnal. The resulting hymn is paired with an early 18th-century German tune.

Postlude: Hymn of Thanksgiving: Te Deum laudamus Jean Langlais

The finale of Langlais' (1907–1991) Trois Paraphrases Grégoriennes takes a portion of the chant Te Deum laudamus as its theme. Originating as early as 387 AD, this canticle ("We Praise Thee, O God,") has inspired composers for centuries. Langlais focused his attention on the conclusion of the chant: "O Lord, in thee have I trusted: Let me never be confounded."
