Prelude: Four English Hymntunes

Charles Callahan

Composer and organist Charles Callahan (b. 1951) is a native of Cambridge, Massachusetts. His writing style has been described by The Washington Post as "gentle, confident lyricism." He was honored by the American Guild of Organists with its 2014 Distinguished Artist Award, "for his illustrious career as composer, performer, teacher and consultant, and his lifelong service to the sacred music profession." He wrote these settings of favorite English hymns in 2012.

Processional Hymn: Awake, Arise, Lift Up Your Voice

Hymn 212

The author of these words, Christopher Smart (1722-1771), was an English poet who wrote for various popular magazines using a number of pseudonyms. He was best known though for his high spiritual ideals, bordering on religious fanaticism at times. His life was frequently unhappy, and he spent much time in hospitals and debtors' prison. However, his poetry was highly praised by his contemporaries and by subsequent English poets.



Sequence Hymn: Rise Up, Ye Saints of God

Hymn 551

This text was written by Presbyterian pastor William Merrill (1867–1954) while he was riding on a steamer in Lake Michigan. After its initial publication in 1911, Merrill's hymn soon found wide popularity across North America and Great Britain.

The Gospel

John 21:1-19

Priest The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.
People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus showed himself again to the disciples by the Sea of Tiberias; and he showed himself in this way. Gathered there together were Simon Peter, Thomas called the Twin, Nathanael of Cana in Galilee, the sons of Zebedee, and two others of his disciples. Simon Peter said to them, "I am going fishing." They said to him, "We will go with you." They went out and got into the boat, but that night they caught nothing.

Just after daybreak, Jesus stood on the beach; but the disciples did not know that it was Jesus. Jesus said to them, "Children, you have no fish, have you?" They answered him, "No." He said to them, "Cast the net to the right side of the boat, and you will find some." So they cast it, and now they were not able to haul it in because there were so many fish. That disciple whom Jesus loved said to Peter, "It is the Lord!" When Simon Peter heard that it was the Lord, he put on some clothes, for he was naked, and jumped into the sea. But the other disciples came in the boat, dragging the net full of fish, for they were not far from the land, only about a hundred yards off.

When they had gone ashore, they saw a charcoal fire there, with fish on it, and bread. Jesus said to them, "Bring some of the fish that you have just caught." So Simon Peter went aboard and hauled the net ashore, full of large fish, a hundred fifty-three of them; and though there were so many, the net was not torn. Jesus said to them, "Come and have breakfast." Now none of the disciples dared to ask him, "Who are you?" because they knew it was the Lord. Jesus came and took the bread and gave it to them, and did the same with the fish. This was now the third time that Jesus appeared to the disciples after he was raised from the dead.

When they had finished breakfast, Jesus said to Simon Peter, "Simon son of John, do you love me more than these?" He said to him, "Yes, Lord; you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Feed my lambs." A second time he said to him, "Simon son of John, do you love me?" He said to him, "Yes, Lord; you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Tend my sheep." He said to him the third time, "Simon son of John, do you love me?" Peter felt hurt because he said to him the third time, "Do you love me?" And he said to him, "Lord, you know everything; you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Feed my sheep. Very truly, I tell you, when you were younger, you used to fasten your own belt and to go wherever you wished. But when you grow old, you will stretch out your hands, and someone else will fasten a belt around you and take you where you do not wish to go." (He said this to indicate the kind of death by which he would glorify God.) After this he said to him, "Follow me."


Offertory Anthem: O Sons and Daughters of the King








Eucharistic Prayer B

And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,


Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven.

The Breaking of the Bread


The Celebrant breaks the consecrated Bread.

This tune was written by American organist and composer Richard Wayne Dirksen (1921-2003), who served in varying roles at the National Cathedral from 1942 to 1991. The refrain incorporates the Latin word "hilariter" (joyfully).

Come, Risen Lord, and Deign to Be Our Guest

Hymn 306

The breaking of bread by the risen Christ with his disciples is the basis for this text that first appeared in The Hymnal 1940. The poet, George Wallace Briggs (1875–1959), was an English hymn writer and Anglican clergyman.

Recessional Hymn: The Head That Once Was Crowned with Thorns

Hymn 483

Noted hymnologist Erik Routley (1917-1982) wrote of this hymn: "here is what is perhaps the finest of all hymns; [Irish cleric] Thomas Kelly (1769-1855) has here comprehended the whole Gospel, and he tells the Good News and of the mysterious mercy by which we may hold on it."

Postlude: The Head That Once Was Crowned with Thorns Charles Callahan

This hymn tune can be confidently attributed to English composer Jeremiah Clarke (1674-1707). It made its first appearance in print during the year of Clarke's death. It was given the title "St. Magnus" in a 1762 songbook, named after a splendid London church rebuilt by Christopher Wren during Clarke's lifetime. Charles Callahan uses the tune as a basis for this bold organ fanfare.
