Preparing for Virtual Worship

Almighty God, to you all hearts are open, all desires known, and from you no secrets are hid: Cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you, and worthily magnify your holy Name; through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Prelude: Three Chorale Preludes

J. S. Bach

When We Are in Utmost Need If Thou But Trust in God to Guide Thee I Will Never Part from God

These pieces come from three important collections of chorale preludes composed by Bach (1685-1750). The first comes from the Orgelbüchlein, which features numerous settings of Lutheran hymns spanning the liturgical year. The second comes from the Schübler Chorales, a set of six preludes that Bach arranged for organ from some of his cantata movements. They were published around 1747 by Johann Georg Schübler. The third comes from the Leipzig Chorales. Also known as the Great Eighteen Chorale Preludes, these were revisions of earlier works that Bach made in the last decade of his life to summarize his mastery of the genre.
