Prelude: Two Chorale Partitas Johann Gottfried Walther on the hymns Blessed Jesus, at Thy Word & Lord Jesus Christ, Turn Thou to Us

Walther (1684-1748) was a German music theorist, organist, composer, and lexicographer. Not only was his life almost exactly contemporaneous to that of J. S. Bach (1685-1750), he was the famous composer's cousin. Walther compiled the Musicalisches Lexicon (Leipzig, 1732), an enormous dictionary of music and musicians, and the first of its kind in Germany.

Processional Hymn: Rejoice, Ye Pure in Heart! Hymn 556 (verses 1-5)

Anglican priest and professor Edward Hayes Plumptre (1821–1891) composed "Rejoice, Ye Pure in Heart" as a processional hymn for a choir festival in one of England's most majestic places of worship, Peterborough Cathedral.






The Collect of the Day

THE WORD OF GOD

The Old Testament (the people sit)

Isaiah 65:17-25

For I am about to create new heavens and a new earth; the former things shall not be remembered or come to mind.

But be glad and rejoice forever in what I am creating;

for I am about to create Jerusalem as a joy, and its people as a delight.

I will rejoice in Jerusalem, and delight in my people;

no more shall the sound of weeping be heard in it, or the cry of distress.

No more shall there be in it an infant that lives but a few days, or an old person who does not live out a lifetime;

for one who dies at a hundred years will be considered a youth, and one who falls short of a hundred will be considered accursed.

They shall build houses and inhabit them; they shall plant vineyards and eat their fruit.

They shall not labor in vain, or bear children for calamity;

The wolf and the lamb shall feed together, the lion shall eat straw like the ox; but the serpent – its food shall be dust!

They shall not hurt or destroy on all my holy mountain, says the LORD.

The New Testament

2 Thessalonians 3:6-13

Now we command you, beloved, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, to keep away from believers who are living in idleness and not according to the tradition that they received from us. For you yourselves know how you ought to imitate us; we were not idle when we were with you, and we did not eat anyone's bread without paying for it; but with toil and labor we worked night and day, so that we might not burden any of you. This was not because we do not have that right, but in order to give you an example to imitate. For even when we were with you, we gave you this command: Anyone unwilling to work should not eat. For we hear that some of you are living in idleness, mere busybodies, not doing any work. Now such persons we command and exhort in the Lord Jesus Christ to do their work quietly and to earn their own living. Brothers and sisters, do not be weary in doing what is right.

Sequence Hymn: If Thou But Trust In God to Guide Thee

Hymn 635

Georg Neumark (1621-1681) wrote this comforting hymn as a testimony of a profound life experience. At the age of 20 he was unemployed and left almost penniless following a robbery. He wrote these words and music in thanksgiving for finding employment several weeks later.

The Gospel Luke 21:5-19

Priest The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke. People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

When some were speaking about the temple, how it was adorned with beautiful stones and gifts dedicated to God, Jesus said, "As for these things that you see, the days will come when not one stone will be left upon another; all will be thrown down."

They asked him, "Teacher, when will this be, and what will be the sign that this is about to take place?" And he said, "Beware that you are not led astray; for many will come in my name and say, 'I am he!' and, 'The time is near!' Do not go after them.

"When you hear of wars and insurrections, do not be terrified; for these things must take place first, but the end will not follow immediately." Then he said to them, "Nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom; there will be great earthquakes, and in various places famines and plagues; and there will be dreadful portents and great signs from heaven.

"But before all this occurs, they will arrest you and persecute you; they will hand you over to synagogues and prisons, and you will be brought before kings and governors because of my name. This will give you an opportunity to testify. So make up your minds not to prepare your defense in advance; for I will give you words and a wisdom that none of your opponents will be able to withstand or contradict. You will be betrayed even by parents and brothers, by relatives and friends; and they will put some of you to death. You will be hated by all because of my name. But not a hair of your head will perish. By your endurance you will gain your souls."

Russell Schulz-Widmar



He was President of the Hymn Society and chaired the music committee of our current Episcopal Hymnal. In retirement, he now spends much of the time in Berlin, Germany.



Eucharistic Prayer B




The Celebrant proceeds

as we forgive those who trespass against us.




The Breaking of the Bread


The Celebrant breaks the consecrated Bread.

Hymn: All My Hope on God Is Founded

Hymn 665

The original German words of this hymn were written by Joachim Neander (1650-1680). It was translated into English in 1899 for an Anglican hymnal. Herbert Howells (1893–1983) encountered the text in 1930, and was moved to set it to an original tune. He named this tune "Michael" to honor his son who had died in childhood.

Hymn: O Day of God, Draw Nigh

Hymn 601

These words were written in 1937 as an expression of hope for peace as the world approached a devastating war. Its author, Robert Balgarnie Young Scott (1899–1987), was a minister in the United Church of Canada and an Old Testament scholar.

It was written by Methodist pastor William W. Reid, Jr. (1923–2007).

Dietrich Buxtehude

Buxtehude (1637-1707) was organist, choirmaster, and treasurer of St. Mary's Church in Lübeck, Germany. His artistry was of such renown that in 1705 a young J. S. Bach walked 250 miles to spend three months listening to his music. This praeludium has three sections: a fantastical prelude, a fugue, and a chaconne (short variations on a repeated bassline).
