Prelude: Creator of the Stars of Night from Three Liturgical Improvisations

George Oldroyd

George Oldroyd (1887–1951) was a British organist who incorporated elements of ancient Gregorian chant into his music. This "liturgical improvisation" is based on the 9^h-century Advent hymn Conditor alme siderum, Hymn 60.

Processional Hymn: Blest Be the King Whose Coming

Hymn 74

Melchior Teschner (1584–1635) wrote this familiar tune. Born in Poland, Teschner studied music theory, philosophy, and theology at universities in Germany. He served as a church musician for nearly ten years, before being ordained as a Lutheran pastor.





Sequence Hymn: Hark! A Thrilling Voice Is Sounding

Hymn 59

This hymn is a translation of a Latin hymn found in two 10th-century sources. This translation has been sung in England since the mid-19th century. It entered our hymnal after being popularized at the King's College Festival of Lessons and Carols.

The Gospel

Matthew 24:36-44

Priest The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke. People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus said to the disciples, "But about that day and hour no one knows, neither the angels of heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father. For as the days of Noah were, so will be the coming of the Son of Man. For as in those days before the flood they were eating and drinking, marrying and giving in marriage, until the day Noah entered the ark, and they knew nothing until the flood came and swept them all away, so too will be the coming of the Son of Man. Then two will be in the field; one will be taken and one will be left. Two women will be grinding meal together; one will be taken and one will be left. Keep awake therefore, for you do not know on what day your Lord is coming. But understand this: if the owner of the house had known in what part of the night the thief was coming, he would have stayed awake and would not have let his house be broken into. Therefore you also must be ready, for the Son of Man is coming at an unexpected hour."

as we forgive those who trespass against us.




The Breaking of the Bread

Communion Music

Hymn: Savior of the Nations, Come!

Hymn 54

This is one of Luther's earliest hymns, written for Advent of 1523. The text is a translation of St. Ambrose's 4th-century hymn Veni Redemptor Gentium. Luther not only translated the Latin text, he also adapted the Gregorian chant melody to be sung by the congregation.

Hymn: Creator of the Stars of Night

Hymn 60

The Latin plainchant Conditor alme siderum is generally thought to have originated in the 9th century. Some sources describe the hymn as being even older: from the 7th century, or even with a 4th-century text by St. Ambrose.

The Post Communion Prayer

The Blessing

Recessional Hymn: Lo! He Comes, with Clouds Descending Hymn 57

This Charles Wesley (1707-1788) text is paired with a tune attributed to the preacher Thomas Olivers (1725-1799), who said that he heard it whistled on the street. Some scholars believe the tune he heard whistled was from an opera by Baroque composer Thomas Arne (1710-1788). Whatever the origin, Charles Wesley's brother John published the text and tune together, and they have been sung during Advent ever since.

Postlude: Savior of the Nations, Come (in Organo Pleno) J. S. Bach

This dramatic setting of Hymn 54 comes from Bach's Great Eighteen "Leipzig" Chorales. Bach specifies that the prelude be played "in Organo Pleno" (using full organ). The hands are given a fugue based on the opening notes of the hymn. The "cantus firmus," the "fixed voice" of the hymn tune, thunders in the pedal.
