# Prelude: Two Settings of "Deck Thyself, My Soul, with Gladness" J. S. Bach and Johannes Brahams

Bach's (1685-1750) setting of Hymn 339 comes from a set of 18 chorale preludes he compiled during the last years of his life. They were significant revisions of earlier works, prepared as a summary of his artistry in the genre. Brahms (1833-1897) also compiled a set of chorale preludes at the end of his life. The genre, forever associated with Bach, was for Brahms a means of paying homage to his musical heritage. He followed the conventions of the form, the most important of which was to paraphrase and elaborate upon the lines of pre-existing Lutheran hymn tunes.

#### Processional Hymn: For All the Saints

Hymn 287 (verses 1-4, 7-8)

With its driving bassline and soaring melody, this hymn is unlike any other. Written by Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872–1958) for use with this text, it stands as one of the finest hymn tunes from any era. Vaughan Williams called this music "Sine Nomine," which means "without a name," in reference to the many saints whose names are known only to God.






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#### The Collect of the Day

But the holy ones of the Most High shall receive the kingdom and possess the kingdom for ever—for ever and ever."

#### The New Testament

Ephesians 1:11-23

In Christ we have also obtained an inheritance, having been destined according to the purpose of him who accomplishes all things according to his counsel and will, so that we, who were the first to set our hope on Christ, might live for the praise of his glory. In him you also, when you had heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation, and had believed in him, were marked with the seal of the promised Holy Spirit; this is the pledge of our inheritance toward redemption as God's own people, to the praise of his glory.

I have heard of your faith in the Lord Jesus and your love toward all the saints, and for this reason I do not cease to give thanks for you as I remember you in my prayers. I pray that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of glory, may give you a spirit of wisdom and revelation as you come to know him, so that, with the eyes of your heart enlightened, you may know what is the hope to which he has called you, what are the riches of his glorious inheritance among the saints, and what is the immeasurable greatness of his power for us who believe, according to the working of his great power. God put this power to work in Christ when he raised him from the dead and seated him at his right hand in the heavenly places, far above all rule and authority and power and dominion, and above every name that is named, not only in this age but also in the age to come. And he has put all things under his feet and has made him the head over all things for the church, which is his body, the fullness of him who fills all in all.

## Sequence Hymn: I Sing a Song of the Saints of God

Hymn 293

This popular hymn has been sung by Episcopalians since the 1940s. Lesbia Scott (1898–1986) composed several children's songs which she sang to her own children as a young mother in her twenties. She wrote that this hymn "was meant for use on Saints' days, to impress the fact that sainthood is a living possibility today."

- "Woe to you who are laughing now, for you will mourn and weep.

If anyone strikes you on the cheek, offer the other also; and from anyone who takes away your coat do not withhold even your shirt. # RESPONDING TO THE WORD

The Nicene Creed (leader and people, all standing)

#### Offertory: Anthem on the tune "O Quanta Qualia"

Healey Willan


O what their joy and their glory must be, those endless Sabbaths the blessed ones see! Crown for the valiant, to weary ones rest; God shall be all, and in all ever blest. Truly Jerusalem name we that shore, 'Vision of peace,' that brings joy evermore! Wish and fulfillment can severed be ne'er, nor the thing prayed for come short of the prayer. There, where no troubles distractions can bring, we the sweet anthems of Zion shall sing, while for thy grace, Lord, their voices of praise thy blessed people eternally raise. Low before him with our praises we fall, of whom, and in whom, and through whom are all: of whom, the Father; and in whom, the Son; through whom, the Spirit, with them ever One. Amen.

The 19th century saw an interest in recovering the treasures of Roman and Orthodox hymnody for use in Anglican worship. The Rev. John Mason Neale (1818-1866) translated many of these texts to beautiful English verse. The 12th-century Latin hymn O Quanta Qualia was written by Peter Abelard (1079-1142). Neale's 19th-century translation was paired with a French melody for inclusion in Anglican hymnals. We will sing a 20th-century choral arrangement by Canadian composer Healey Willan (1880-1968).





And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us.





#### Solo: Litany for the Feast of All Souls

Franz Schubert

English Translation: Rest in peace, all souls who have had done with anxious torment, who have had done with sweet dreams, who, sated with life and hardly born, have departed from this world: all souls rest in peace! And those who never smiled at the sun, keeping watch on the thorns beneath the moon, to see God in the pure heavenly light and look him just once in the face: all who have parted from here, all souls rest in peace!

Franz Schubert (1797–1828) was an Austrian composer, whose output consists of more than six hundred secular vocal works (mainly Lieder), seven complete symphonies, sacred music, operas, incidental music and a large body of chamber and piano music.

#### Hymn: Deck Thyself, My Soul, with Gladness

Hymn 339

Anglican hymnody has been enriched by the incorporation of German chorales in English translation. Those by English hymn writer Catherine Winkworth (1827-1878) were the most enduring. The joyful music, cast in a gentle dance-like style, was written by German composer Johann Crüger (1598-1662).

#### Motet: *Epitaph*

#### Ross Anderson Smith

God was at my coming, God be at my going. May God be at my reaping as God was at my sowing. My life is in his keeping. His love is past my knowing.

The author of this poem, Texas native, Dr. Leon R. Smith, Jr., was for many years professor of music theory, composition, and electronic music at the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point. This setting of his poem 'Epitaph' was composed by his son (and St. Mark's Choir member) Ross Smith.

#### Recessional Hymn: Ye Watchers and Ye Holy Ones

Hymn 618

This text was written for use in The English Hymnal of 1906. Its author, John Athelstan Laurie Riley (1858-1945) was an Anglo-Catholic hymn writer and translator who served as chair of that hymnal's editorial board. The tune was composed by Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872–1958).

#### Postlude: Fugue in D Major

J. S. Bach

This fugue is notable for its charm, drama, and the unprecedented virtuosity of the pedal line. The idiosyncratic fugue subject is enigmatic; split in half by a long rest and almost childlike in the obstinate insistence of the opening figure. The fugue is consistently lighthearted, and even its moves to minor key areas are transient and playful. Bach (1685-1750) likely wrote this piece while serving the duke in Weimar from 1708-1717.
