Prelude: Four Chorale Preludes

Healey Willan

This morning's organ pieces and sequence hymn were chosen to honor the memory of Barbara Jones (Jan. 3, 1938 — Oct. 5, 2022). Before her retirement, Barbara served for 33 years as Organist and Choirmaster at St. Mary's Episcopal Church in Dade City, Florida. I began taking organ lessons with Barbara as a high school student in 1991. It was the start of a lifetime of mentorship and guidance from a wise and faithful church musician. I studied these beautiful chorales by Canadian composer Healey Willan (1880-1968) with Barbara during that first year of lessons.

Processional Hymn: Praise to the Living God!

Hymn 372

This is an American Judeo-Christian hymn written in 1884 by Max Landsburg (a rabbi) and Newton Mann (a Unitarian minister). It was intended as an interfaith paraphrase of the Jewish hymn "Yigdal." It first appeared in the Jewish Union Hymnal of 1910.






The Collect of the Day

THE WORD OF GOD

The Old Testament (the people sit)

Jeremiah 31:27-34

The days are surely coming, says the LORD, when I will sow the house of Israel and the house of Judah with the seed of humans and the seed of animals. And just as I have watched over them to pluck up and break down, to overthrow, destroy, and bring evil, so I will watch over them to build and to plant, says the LORD. In those days they shall no longer say:

"The parents have eaten sour grapes, and the children's teeth are set on edge."

But all shall die for their own sins; the teeth of everyone who eats sour grapes shall be set on edge.

The days are surely coming, says the LORD, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah. It will not be like the covenant that I made with their ancestors when I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt – a covenant that they broke, though I was their husband, says the LORD. But this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, says the LORD: I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people. No longer shall they teach one another, or say to each other, "Know the LORD," for they shall all know me, from the least of them to the greatest, says the LORD; for I will forgive their iniquity, and remember their sin no more.

The New Testament

2 Timothy 3:14-4:5

As for you, continue in what you have learned and firmly believed, knowing from whom you learned it, and how from childhood you have known the sacred writings that are able to instruct you for salvation through faith in Christ Jesus. All scripture is inspired by God and is useful for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, so that everyone who belongs to God may be proficient, equipped for every good work.

In the presence of God and of Christ Jesus, who is to judge the living and the dead, and in view of his appearing and his kingdom, I solemnly urge you: proclaim the message; be persistent whether the time is favorable or unfavorable; convince, rebuke, and encourage, with the utmost patience in teaching. For the time is coming when people will not put up with sound doctrine, but having itching ears, they will accumulate for themselves teachers to suit their own desires, and will turn away from listening to the truth and wander away to myths. As for you, always be sober, endure suffering, do the work of an evangelist, carry out your ministry fully.

Sequence Hymn: O Christ, the Word Incarnate

This was the first hymn I accompanied on the organ, at the sequence during a service at St. Mary's Church in Dade City, Florida in the spring of 1992. My teacher Barbara Jones (1938-2022) invited me to play the prelude, sequence hymn, and postlude as part of my organ instruction. She sat with me on the organ bench during this hymn; gently singing and offering words of encouragement.

Offertory Anthem: Teach Me, O Lord

Thomas Attwood


Teach me, O Lord, the way of thy statutes, and I shall keep it unto the end.

Thomas Attwood (1765–1838) was organist at St. Paul's Cathedral in London and composer of the Chapel Royal. From 1785–1787 he spent time studying in Vienna as a favorite pupil of Mozart. He preserved his composition exercises from this time, providing a rare opportunity to enter the creative "workshop" of the legendary composer.



Eucharistic Prayer B




The Celebrant proceeds



The Breaking of the Bread


The Celebrant breaks the consecrated Bread.

These words were written by the English priest Percy Dearmer (1867–1936). Dearmer is best known today as the author of The Parson's Handbook, a liturgical manual for Anglican clergy, and (working alongside Ralph Vaughan Williams) as editor of The English Hymnal (1906).

This song was written by Karen Lafferty in 1971, following a Bible study on Matthew 6. Lafferty (b. 1948) is a Christian songwriter and folk musician who gained worldwide influence through her musical leadership at one of America's largest churches, Calvary Chapel in Costa Mesa, California.

The source material for this hymn is a German poem written by Lutheran pastor J. F. Bahnmaier (1774-1841). It was translated by two Episcopal clergymen in the early 20th century before being further revised, with a new final stanza, for our current hymnal.

This setting of an Easter tune (Hymn 205) was the first organ postlude I played in a church service, in the spring of 1992. I can think of no better tribute to the ministry of my teacher Barbara Jones—skilled organist, caring choir director, wise teacher, loving shepherd, and faithful servant—than the words of this hymn: "Good Christians, all, rejoice and sing! Now is the triumph of our King! To all the world glad news we bring: Alleluia, Alleluia, Alleluia!"
