GATHERING

Prelude: Two Settings of "A Mighty Fortress"

Dietrich Buxtehude and Johann Pachelbel

German contemporaries Buxtehude (1637-1707) and Pachelbel (1653-1706) were two of the most important composers of the mid-Baroque. Buxtehude's setting of "A Mighty Fortress" cloaks the tune in ornaments and embellishments. Each phrase of the tune is separated by interludes that foreshadow the music to come. Pachelbel's setting begins with a fugue on the first phrase of the hymn. The complete tune is then presented in the pedal, with toccata figuration given to the hands.

Processional Hymn: A Mighty Fortress Is Our God

In addition to All Hallows Eve, tomorrow is known as Reformation Day; when Martin Luther posted his 95 theses on the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg, Germany. The events of October 31, 1517 are commemorated throughout much of the Protestant world, with particular emphasis given in the Lutheran and Calvinist traditions. This paraphrase of Psalm 46 is one of Luther's (1483–1546) best known hymns, for which he wrote both text and tune.





The Old Testament (the people sit)

Habakkuk 1:1-4; 2:1-4

The oracle that the prophet Habakkuk saw.

Sequence Hymn: In Your Mercy, Lord, You Called Me

Hymn 706

Author Josiah Conder (1789-1855) wrote this hymn as a reflection on the Wesleyan theology of grace. Episcopal theologian Charles Price (1920-1999) edited his text and championed its inclusion in The Hymnal 1982.

The Gospel Luke 19:1-10

Priest The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus entered Jericho and was passing through it. A man was there named Zacchaeus; he was a chief tax collector and was rich. He was trying to see who Jesus was, but on account of the crowd he could not, because he was short in stature. So he ran ahead and climbed a sycamore tree to see him, because he was going to pass that way. When Jesus came to the place, he looked up and said to him, "Zacchaeus, hurry and come down; for I must stay at your house today." So he hurried down and was happy to welcome him. All who saw it began to grumble and said, "He has gone to be the guest of one who is a sinner." Zacchaeus stood there and said to the Lord, "Look, half of my possessions, Lord, I will give to the poor; and if I have defrauded anyone of anything, I will pay back four times as much." Then Jesus said to him, "Today salvation has come to this house, because he too is a son of Abraham. For the Son of Man came to seek out and to save the lost."

Offertory Anthem: There's a Wideness in God's Mercy Karen Marrolli








The Celebrant proceeds

And lead us not into temptation,





Franz Schubert (1797–1828) was an Austrian composer, whose output consists of more than six hundred secular vocal works (mainly Lieder), seven complete symphonies, sacred music, operas, incidental music and a large body of chamber and piano music.

Hymn: O Bless the Lord, My Soul!

Hymn 411

This paraphrase of Psalm 103 by Scottish pastor James Montgomery (1771–1854) demonstrates confident trust in a loving and forgiving God. Montgomery's ministry was centered on sharing God's love in people's daily lives. He was especially focused on curtailing child labor and on the fight to abolish slavery.

The Blessing

Recessional Hymn: O Love, How Deep, How Broad, How High Hymn 448

Recounting the life of Christ, this hymn comes from an anonymous 15th-century Latin hymn. By reducing the 23 stanzas of the original Latin hymn, this translation intensifies this survey of the mystery of the Incarnation and strengthens the repeated reminder that all was done "for us."

Eugène Gigout

Gigout (1844–1925) began playing the organ for church services at age 10. He was soon sent from his home in Nancy, France to study in Paris. He eventually taught at the Paris Conservatoire and served at the Église Saint-Augustin. This 1892 composition is written in the style of his famous organ improvisations.
