WORSHIP

Welcome to St. Mark's! We're so glad you're here. Our worship follows a similar pattern each week—it always includes readings from Scripture, lots of prayer, songs of praise, and most centrally, a meal we eat together called Eucharist. We invite you to participate to the extent you feel comfortable. If you're new to this kind of worship and flipping through the bulletin feels overwhelming, feel free to just set it down, relax, and join in worship by letting us say the words on your behalf.

SPECIAL COVID INSTRUCTIONS

By attending this service, you agree to the following:

I understand to the best of my knowledge, I/we have not tested positive for or experienced any symptoms of COVID-19 in the past 14 days. If I/we subsequently learn that I/we have been exposed to someone with COVID-19 in the 14 days prior to the service or should I/we test positive for COVID-19 in the week following I agree I will contact a member of church staff immediately.

On masks - for the time being, we ask that everyone over the age of two wear a mask over their nose and mouth while indoors regardless of their vaccination status, with the exception of those serving in leadership roles within the liturgy. This accords with current CDC guidance for "congregant settings" and is a way we can protect those still vulnerable in our community. All church staff, readers, choir members, and children's church leaders have been fully vaccinated.

INFORMATION FOR FAMILIES WITH CHILDREN

Supervised Play is available on the main playground during this service, staffed by our vaccinated and Safeguarded childcare team. Parents should drop off their kids at the main playground gate before the service and pick up at the same location after the service ends. Masking for children while outdoors is optional and left to the discretion of the parents; children over the age of two are required to mask when entering the building.

Élisabeth Jacquet de La Guerre (1665-1729) was a French harpsichordist and organist for the court of Louis XIV. She was a prolific composer of chamber music, vocal works, and opera. Very little is known about British composer Elizabeth Turner (1700-1756) apart from the fact that several of her songs and keyboard compositions were included alongside works of Boyce and Handel in contemporary collections. Italian composer Anna Bon (1738-c.1769) wrote numerous sonatas, chamber music, vocal and choral works, and an opera.







The Gospel John 6:1-21

Celebrant The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus went to the other side of the Sea of Galilee, also called the Sea of Tiberias. A large crowd kept following him, because they saw the signs that he was doing for the sick. Jesus went up the mountain and sat down there with his disciples. Now the Passover, the festival of the Jews, was near. When he looked up and saw a large crowd coming toward him, Jesus said to Philip, "Where are we to buy bread for these people to eat?" He said this to test him, for he himself knew what he was going to do. Philip answered him, "Six months' wages would not buy enough bread for each of them to get a little." One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said to him, "There is a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish. But what are they among so many people?" Jesus said, "Make the people sit down." Now there was a great deal of grass in the place; so they sat down, about five thousand in all. Then Jesus took the loaves, and when he had given thanks, he distributed them to those who were seated; so also the fish, as much as they wanted. When they were satisfied, he told his disciples, "Gather up the fragments left over, so that nothing may be lost." So they gathered them up, and from the fragments of the five barley loaves, left by those who had eaten, they filled twelve baskets. When the people saw the sign that he had done, they began to say, "This is indeed the prophet who is to come into the world."

When Jesus realized that they were about to come and take him by force to make him king, he withdrew again to the mountain by himself. When evening came, his disciples went down to the sea, got into a boat, and started across the sea to Capernaum. It was now dark, and Jesus had not yet come to them. The sea became rough because a strong wind was blowing. When they

had rowed about three or four miles, they saw Jesus walking on the sea and coming near the boat, and they were terrified. But he said to them, "It is I; do not be afraid." Then they wanted to take him into the boat, and immediately the boat reached the land toward which they were going.
