

A native of Asheville, North Carolina, Mark Jones (1957-2017) spent most of his career as music director of a large Presbyterian church in Pompano Beach, Florida. THE WORD OF GOD

The First Reading

Genesis 17:1-7, 15-16

When Abram was ninety-nine years old, the Lord appeared to Abram, and said to him, "I am God Almighty; walk before me, and be blameless. And I will make my covenant between me and you, and will make you exceedingly numerous." Then Abram fell on his face; and God said to him, "As for me, this is my covenant with you: You shall be the ancestor of a multitude of nations. No longer shall your name be Abram, but your name shall be Abraham; for I have made you the ancestor of a multitude of nations. I will make you exceedingly fruitful; and I will make nations of you, and kings shall come from you. I will establish my covenant between me and you, and your offspring after you throughout their generations, for an everlasting covenant, to be God to you and to your offspring after you.

God said to Abraham, "As for Sarai your wife, you shall not call her Sarai, but Sarah shall be her name. I will bless her, and moreover I will give you a son by her. I will bless her, and she shall give rise to nations; kings of peoples shall come from her."

The Gospel Mark 8:31-38

Jesus began to teach his disciples that the Son of Man must undergo great suffering, and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes, and be killed, and after three days rise again. He said all this quite openly. And Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him. But turning and looking at his disciples, he rebuked Peter and said, "Get behind me, Satan! For you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things."

He called the crowd with his disciples, and said to them, "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it. For what will it profit them to gain the whole world

and forfeit their life? Indeed, what can they give in return for their life? Those who are ashamed of me and of my words in this adulterous and sinful generation, of them the Son of Man will also be ashamed when he comes in the glory of his Father with the holy angels."

In the shadow where we linger, in this darkness we call home, where the sighs are deep and doubtful and our aspirations groan, all is not in vain, beloved, our travail is not unknown. Dan Forrest (b. 1978) is an American composer and pianist. After an early academic focus on piano, Forrest earned a doctorate in composition from the University of Kansas. He studied with legendary composer and folk music expert Alice Parker (b. 1925). His music has been performed in leading venues around the world including Carnegie Hall, the Lincoln Center, NPR's Performance Today, and the BBC Proms.

Postlude: Lead, Kindly Light, Amid the Encircling Gloom Neil Harmon

Though it gradually fell out of use during the 20th century, this hymn based on words by English theologian and poet John Henry Newman (1801-1890) was very popular in 19th-century England. Newman, first an Anglican priest and later a Roman Catholic cardinal, wrote the words while suffering from a severe illness in 1833. The hymn became a source of comfort for many during difficult times in the Victorian era. It was a favorite of Mahatma Gandhi. This setting was made by American composer Neil Harmon (b. 1969). The hymn begins with these words:

Lead, kindly Light, amid the encircling gloom; Lead thou me on! The night is dark, and I am far from home; Lead thou me on! Keep thou my feet; I do not ask to see

The distant scene—one step enough for me.
