Missouri native Dr. Emma Lou Diemer (b. 1927) studied at Yale and the Eastman School, and was a Fulbright scholar in Belgium. She is professor emeritus of theory and composition at UC Santa Barbara. This innovative setting of a German hymn tune was written in 1975, and evokes the style of 20th-century French composer Olivier Messiaen. Louis Vierne (1870-1937) was organist at the cathedral of Notre-Dame de Paris from 1900 until his death in 1937. He wrote six organ symphonies for the magnificent space and its massive Cavaillé-Coll organ.

THE WORD OF GOD

The First Reading

Numbers 21:4-9

From Mount Hor the Israelites set out by the way to the Red Sea, to go around the land of Edom; but the people became impatient on the way. The people spoke against God and against Moses, "Why have you brought us up out of Egypt to die in the wilderness? For there is no food and no water, and we detest this miserable food." Then the Lord sent poisonous serpents among the people, and they bit the people, so that many Israelites died. The people came to Moses and said, "We have sinned by speaking against the Lord and against you; pray to the Lord to take away the serpents from us." So Moses prayed for the people. And the Lord said to Moses, "Make a poisonous serpent, and set it on a pole; and everyone who is bitten shall look at it and live." So Moses made a serpent of bronze, and put it upon a pole; and whenever a serpent bit someone, that person would look at the serpent of bronze and live.

The Gospel John 3:14-21

Jesus said, "Just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, that whoever believes in him may have eternal life. "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life. "Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him. Those who believe in him are not condemned; but those who do not believe are condemned already, because they have not believed in the name of the only Son of God. And this is the judgment, that the light has come into the world, and people loved darkness rather than light because their deeds were evil. For all who do evil hate the light and do not come to the light, so that their deeds may not be exposed. But those who do what is true come to the light, so that it may be clearly seen that their deeds have been done in God."

Music for Reflection: When I Survey the Wondrous Cross Hymn 474

When I survey the wondrous cross where the young Prince of Glory died, my richest gain I count but loss, and pour contempt on all my pride. Forbid it, Lord, that I should boast, save in the cross of Christ, my God: all the vain things that charm me most, I sacrifice them to his blood. See, from his head, his hands, his feet sorrow and love flow mingled down! Did e'er such love and sorrow meet, or thorns compose so rich a crown? Were the whole realm of nature mine, that were an offering far too small; love so amazing, so divine, demands my soul, my life, my all.

This familiar text from the beginning of the 18th century grew out of Isaac Watts's (1674-1748) desire to give Christians the ability to sing about gospel events. His original title for the hymn was "Crucifixion to the World by the Cross of Christ." It has been acclaimed as one of the finest English hymns for its carefully crafted language depicting Christ's suffering.

Postlude: O Bread of Life from Heaven

Johannes Brahms

Brahms (1833-1897) spent the summer of 1896, his last, in Austria. In the previous few years he had lost a great many of his closest friends, including the pianist and composer Clara Schumann. The grueling 40-hour journey which he undertook to attend her funeral undoubtedly took its toll on his own health; and he spent much of his time putting his affairs in order. It was in Austria that he composed his last music, the Eleven Chorale Preludes for Organ, Op 122. This tune is paired with the German text "O World, I Now Must Leave Thee" in Brahms's collection. In America and England, it is usually associated with a Eucharistic text reflecting on Christ as the Bread of Life.
