Charles-Marie Widor

Hedwige Chrétien (1859-1944) was a prolific French composer of keyboard, orchestral, and chamber music. She was appointed professor at the Paris Conservatoire in 1889 where she had previously been a student from 1874. One year later, in 1890, Charles-Marie Widor (1844-1937) became professor of organ at the Conservatoire. He was an outstanding organist and composer, mostly remembered today for his ten organ symphonies. His contributions to teaching and scholarship continue to have a significant impact on European and American sacred music.

THE WORD OF GOD

The First Reading

1 Corinthians 1:18-25

The message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. For it is written, "I will destroy the wisdom of the wise, and the discernment of the discerning I will thwart."

Where is the one who is wise? Where is the scribe? Where is the debater of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world? For since, in the wisdom of God, the world did not know God through wisdom, God decided, through the foolishness of our proclamation, to save those who believe. For Jews demand signs and Greeks desire wisdom, but we proclaim Christ crucified, a stumbling block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles, but to those who are the called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. For God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom, and God's weakness is stronger than human strength.

The Gospel John 2:13-22

The Passover of the Jews was near, and Jesus went up to Jerusalem. In the temple he found people selling cattle, sheep, and doves, and the money changers seated at their tables. Making a whip of cords, he drove all of them out of the temple, both the sheep and the cattle. He also poured out the coins of the money changers and overturned their tables. He told those who were selling the doves, "Take these things out of here! Stop making my Father's house a marketplace!" His disciples remembered that it was written, "Zeal for your house will consume me." The Jews then said to him, "What sign can you show us for doing this?" Jesus answered them, "Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up." The Jews then said, "This temple has been under construction for forty-six years, and will you raise it up in three days?" But he was speaking of the temple of his body. After he was raised from the dead, his disciples

remembered that he had said this; and they believed the scripture and the word that Jesus had spoken.

Thomas Attwood

Teach me, O Lord, the way of thy statutes; and I shall keep it unto the end.

St. Mark's Virtual Choir

English composer and organist Thomas Attwood (1765-1838) was very active in the musical life of England, holding posts as musician to the Prince of Wales, organist of St. Paul's Cathedral, composer to the Chapel Royal and professor at the Royal Academy of Music. He studied in Vienna for two years as a favorite pupil of Mozart. Attwood's notebook from these lessons remains in print today for the information it reveals about Mozart's compositional practice. Mendelssohn stayed at Attwood's London home while recuperating from a carriage accident, and later dedicated three of his organ compositions to Attwood in gratitude.

Postlude: Andante from Sonata No. 6 in D Minor Felix Mendelssohn

In a testament to Mendelssohn's fame, his six organ sonatas were published simultaneously in Britain, France, Germany, and Italy. Robert Schumann wrote to Mendelssohn in 1845 that he and his wife Clara had played them over and described them as "intensely poetical... what a perfect picture they form!" This gentle movement brings the final sonata to a quiet end.
