

GATHERING

Prelude: Toccata in F Major, BWV 540

J. S. Bach

Bach's (1685-1750) Toccata in F is an exuberant exploration of canonic counterpoint. In a musical canon a melody is imitated at a specified time interval by one or more parts. The first third of this Toccata consists of canons played by the hands over a static pedal point. An improvisatory pedal solo follows each of these canons, further developing the musical material. The remainder of the Toccata features stunning invertible counterpoint. Imitative melodies are moved around from the top, middle, or bottom of the musical texture. Harmonically, the music pulls away from F major and then, in an elaborate process, finds its way back to a triumphant homecoming. Along the way, there are surprises in the form of cadences which set up our expectations for a resolution and then pull the rug out from under us to propel the music forward. The Toccata demonstrates Bach's ability to find drama and creative expression within the framework of technically flawless counterpoint.

The Gospel John 20:1-18

So she ran and went to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one whom Jesus loved, and said to them, "They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid him." Then Peter and the other disciple set out and went toward the tomb. The two were running together, but the other disciple outran Peter and reached the tomb first. He bent down to look in and saw the linen wrappings lying there, but he did not go in. Then Simon Peter came, following him, and went into the tomb. He saw the linen wrappings lying there, and the cloth that had been on Jesus' head, not lying with the linen wrappings but rolled up in a place by itself. Then the other disciple, who reached the tomb first, also went in, and he saw and believed; for as yet they did not understand the scripture, that he must rise from the dead. Then the disciples returned to their homes.

But Mary stood weeping outside the tomb. As she wept, she bent over to look into the tomb; and she saw two angels in white, sitting where the body of Jesus had been lying, one at the head

and the other at the feet. They said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping?" She said to them, "They have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him." When she had said this, she turned around and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not know that it was Jesus. Jesus said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping? Whom are you looking for?" Supposing him to be the gardener, she said to him, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away." Jesus said to her, "Mary!" She turned and said to him in Hebrew, "Rabbouni!" (which means Teacher). Jesus said to her, "Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet ascended to the Father. But go to my brothers and say to them, 'I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God." Mary Magdalene went and announced to the disciples, "I have seen the Lord"; and she told them that he had said these things to her.

Postlude: Toccata from Symphony No. 5

Charles-Marie Widor

Widor (1844-1937) served as organist of St. Sulpice in Paris for 64 years. He influenced numerous 20th-century composers and organists through his teaching at the Paris Conservatory. His scholarship, especially in partnership with Dr. Albert Schweitzer, led to the publication of one of the first historically authentic editions of Bach's organ works. This Toccata is the finale from the fifth of Widor's ten organ symphonies. Its perpetual 16th-note motion in the right hand, crisp repeated chords in the left hand, and octave-leaping melody in the pedals made it immediately popular with audiences and organists.
