GATHERING

Preparing for Virtual Worship

Set up a space in your home for worship and prayer. Light a candle, set out a cross or icon to help you focus; set your phone on Do Not Disturb, wash your hands. Take a few deep breaths and say a short prayer to prepare your heart to "enter" a different kind of space. We recommend the Collect for Purity:

Almighty God, to you all hearts are open, all desires known, and from you no secrets are hid: Cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you, and worthily magnify your holy Name; through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Prelude: Two Advent Chorales

J. S. Bach

Savior of the Nations, Come "Sleepers, Wake!" A Voice Astounds Us

In the first of these chorale preludes, a setting of Hymn 54, Bach (1685-1750) evokes the anguish of the world awaiting a savior with writing that is poignantly beautiful. The hymn tune is embellished in the manner of an operatic soprano voice. The second is an organ transcription Bach made from one of his cantatas. The tune of Hymn 61 is presented in the tenor register. The bass and treble parts form a lively, dance-like accompaniment that urges the listener to awaken for the coming of the Lord.

The Gospel Mark 13:24-37

Jesus said, "In those days, after that suffering, the sun will be darkened, and the moon will not give its light, and the stars will be falling from heaven, and the powers in the heavens will be shaken. Then they will see 'the Son of Man coming in clouds' with great power and glory. Then he will send out the angels, and gather his elect from the four winds, from the ends of the earth to the ends of heaven. "From the fig tree learn its lesson: as soon as its branch becomes tender and puts forth its leaves, you know that summer is near. So also, when you see these things taking place, you know that he is near, at the very gates. Truly I tell you, this generation will not pass away until all these things have taken place. Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will not pass away.

"But about that day or hour no one knows, neither the angels in heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father. Beware, keep alert; for you do not know when the time will come. It is like a man going on a journey, when he leaves home and puts his slaves in charge, each with his work, and commands the doorkeeper to be on the watch. Therefore, keep awake—for you do not know when the master of the house will come, in the evening, or at midnight, or at cockcrow, or at dawn, or else he may find you asleep when he comes suddenly. And what I say to you I say to all: Keep awake."

Music for Reflection: O Come, O Come, Emmanuel

Hymn 56 (vs. 1-2)

O come, O come, Emmanuel, and ransom captive Israel, that mourns in lonely exile here until the Son of God appear. *Refrain: Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel shall come to thee, O Israel!* O come, thou Wisdom from on high, who orderest all things mightily; to us the path of knowledge show, and teach us in her ways to go. *Refrain*.

This hymn has its origin in a series of antiphons for Advent vespers that arose no later than the 8th century. These antiphons were traditionally sung from December 17 to 23. The second word of each Latin antiphon yields an acrostic, spelling out the letters ERO CRAS: "I shall be present tomorrow." If one antiphon was sung each day, the full text of the acrostic was revealed only on the day before Christmas Eve. In a modification of the ancient tradition, we will hear two verses of the carol on each Sunday of Advent.

The Offertory Hymn: Lo! He Comes, with Clouds Descending Hymn 57

Every eye shall now behold him, robed in dreadful majesty; those who set at nought and sold him, pierced, and nailed him to the tree, deeply wailing, shall the true Messiah see. Yea, amen! let all adore thee, high on thine eternal throne; Savior, take the power and glory; claim the kingdom for thine own: Alleluia! Thou shalt reign, and thou alone.

In this hymn we have a classic Charles Wesley (1707-1788) text. The tune is attributed to the preacher Thomas Olivers (1725-1799), who said he adapted it from something he heard whistled on the street. Some scholars believe the tune he heard whistled must have been from an opera by Baroque composer Thomas Arne (1710-1788). Whatever the origin, Charles Wesley's brother John published the text and tune together, and they have been sung during Advent ever since.

This is another Bach setting of Hymn 54. In contrast to the introspective writing heard during this morning's prelude, this is a dramatic setting "in Organo Pleno" (full organ). The hands are given a fugue based on the opening notes of the hymn. The "cantus firmus," the "fixed voice" of the hymn tune, thunders in the pedal. If the quiet first setting of the tune represents the soul awaiting the coming Savior, this version seems to depict the unexpected arrival described in our Gospel lesson.
