GATHERING

Preparing for Virtual Worship

Set up a space in your home for worship and prayer. Light a candle, set out a cross or icon to help you focus; set your phone on Do Not Disturb, wash your hands. Take a few deep breaths and say a short prayer to prepare your heart to "enter" a different kind of space. We recommend the Collect for Purity:

Almighty God, to you all hearts are open, all desires known, and from you no secrets are hid: Cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you, and worthily magnify your holy Name; through Christ our Lord. Amen.

"Lo, How a Rose E'er Blooming" is a beloved Advent hymn whose origins may be traced back to a late 16th century manuscript found in St. Alban's monastery in Trier, Germany. An apocryphal legend to explain the rose imagery says that on Christmas Eve a monk found a blooming rose while walking in the woods, and then placed the rose in a vase on an altar to the Virgin Mary. Scriptural references include Song of Solomon 2:1: "I am the rose of Sharon, and the lily of the valleys," and Isaiah 35:1, "The wilderness and the solitary place shall be glad for them; and the desert shall rejoice, and blossom as the rose." The famous composer Michael Praetorius helped popularize the tune by harmonizing it in 1609.

The First Reading

1 Thessalonians 5:16-24

Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you. Do not quench the Spirit. May the God of peace himself sanctify you entirely; and may your spirit and soul and body be kept sound and blameless at the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ. The Gospel John 1:6-8, 19-28

There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light.

This is the testimony given by John when the Jews sent priests and Levites from Jerusalem to ask him, "Who are you?" He confessed and did not deny it, but confessed, "I am not the Messiah." And they asked him, "What then? Are you Elijah?" He said, "I am not." "Are you the prophet?" He answered, "No." Then they said to him, "Who are you? Let us have an answer for those who sent us. What do you say about yourself?" He said, "I am the voice of one crying out in the wilderness, 'Make straight the way of the Lord," as the prophet Isaiah said. Now they had been sent from the Pharisees. They asked him, "Why then are you baptizing if you are neither the Messiah, nor Elijah, nor the prophet?" John answered them, "I baptize with water. Among you stands one whom you do not know, the one who is coming after me; I am not worthy to untie the thong of his sandal." This took place in Bethany across the Jordan where John was baptizing.

The original text comes from an 18th-century French breviary and was translated to English for a 19th-century Anglican hymnal. This version was paired with a rousing tune that has been a favorite of the English church ever since.

Adolphus Hailstork

One of America's leading composers, Hailstork (b. 1941) has written in nearly all genres, from musical comedy to solo piano and choral music. His compositions have been performed by major orchestras and he has been the recipient of several prizes, among them the Ernest Bloch Award for Choral Music in 1995. Hailstork grew up in Albany, New York, where he took lessons in voice, violin, piano and organ. He studied composition at Howard University and the Manhattan School of Music, and, after service in the U.S. Armed Forces, earned his doctorate at Michigan State University. He is currently a Professor of Music at Old Dominion University in Norfolk, Virginia.
